REPORTS.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 27th.

In a fast opening game, on a slipping pitch at Shotley, the School lost 2—4 to H.M.S. Ganges (Boys), with four players missing through illness and injury. Towards the end of an even first half, Ganges scored two goals in as many minutes, through their left-wing pair. On restarting, they scored two more goals through the centre-forward and insideright; the School then woke up, attacking until the end, and scoring through Marriott, from the edge of the circle, and Loades close in.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 3rd.

Against Northgate, at Ipswich, in continuous rain and on a muddy ground, the School lost 2—4 for the second time. Northgate obtained a 3—0 lead by half-time through the centreforward, inside-left and outside-right, the last cutting into the circle at terrific speed and finishing with a hard shot. When the centre-forward had added a fourth goal, the School started to play open hockey and scored two goals by Gould, from a right-wing centre, and Abbott, J. following a clearance by the goalkeeper.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 10th.

The first of seven consecutive home games, against Shell B.P. (Ipswich), was won 4—1 on a reasonably firm but wet pitch. The game was fairly fast from the start, and the School opened the scoring when Shelbourne, H. shot in from a leftwing centre; Shell equalised from a penalty bully against Kohler, taken by the centre-forward. The lead was regained by Abbott, J. who swept the ball past the goalkeeper from a kneeling position; this lead was further increased when Abbott, P. scored from the left-wing with a flick. After half-time, Marriott added a fourth goal with a hard shot from a corner on the left.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 17th.

Ipswich Y.M.C.A. 2nd XI., our next visitors, were beaten 1—0 in a fairly even game which never reached great heights. The only goal came after 20 minutes, Abbott, J. scoring with a hard, rising first-time shot from the centre-forward's pass. Good approach work was shown by both sides but poor finishing resulted in a score which made two mediocre defences appear good. Rush, K. played inside-left for the Y.M.C.A., who, owing to illness, brought only ten men.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 22nd.

Against Culford 2nd XI., who brought with them an excellent record, the School drew 3—3 in a hard-fought match. The School took the lead early on by a goal from Abbott, P. who beat the advancing goalkeeper with a clever flick. Soon afterwards a second was added when Shelbourne, H. finished off a good movement on the right. After changing over, Gould brought the score to 3—0 with an acute-angled shot on the left. Then Culford hit back with two goals by the centreforward, and an equalising goal by their centre-half and Captain resulted when his weak shot was misjudged by the goalkeeper.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 24th.

The Old Boys' XI., consisting of: Turvey, Bloomfield, Hughes, Baxter, Marshall, G., Macdonald, Butterfield, Herbert, Rush, B., Shelbourne, P., and Berry, provided poor opposition, being beaten 7-0. Opening the scoring after ten minutes play, Shelbourne, H. shot from the edge of the circle, a second goal being scored just before half-time, from a scrimmage in front of goal, by Abbott, J. On changing over, Abbott, P. shot past the advancing goalkeeper from the edge of the circle; from a good right-wing movement, Abbott, J. scored a fourth goal from five yards. Gould added a fifth when his shot from the left-wing just beat the goalkeeper, who, incidentally, played a very good game. Jennings next scored the best goal of the match with a hard, well placed shot from a corner, Gould bringing the score to 7-0 with a goal which the left-back put in for him. Marshall tried hard to get the Old Boys moving, but with no support.

THURSDAY, MARCH 1st.

This was the old story of a side of eleven experienced individuals playing a school team. The School drew 1—1 against a County XI. far superior to the team which the S.H.A. sent last season, in a game which at one period tended to become a little robust. After twenty minutes of an even first half, the County outside-right scored from the edge of the circle; the County were always dangerous on corners, which Ockendon covered well. Although the School deserved at least to equalise, that goal, midway through the second half, resulted from a piece of poor goalkeeping; from a corner on the left, the right-back, Seddon, put in a shot which the goalie half-stopped but allowed to trickle into the net.

SATURDAY, MARCH 3rd.

Against Northgate, the School played the best game of the season, defence and attack showing good understanding, teamwork, and a good team spirit. The outside-left had a good game, and a shot of his, taken on the run, rebounded from the post to Shelbourne, H. who opened the scoring. Abbott, P. scored a second when he hit a back pass hard into the net. After half-time, Abbott, P. scored his second goal to bring the score to 3—0, when he forced his way into the circle and shot past the goalkeeper.

SATURDAY, MARCH 10th.

In the return match against H.M.S. Ganges (Boys) the School won 6-1. That this score was not trebled was due to the brilliance of the Ganges goalkeeper, bad luck, and the inability of the School to press home their advantage after good approach work. Strangely enough, Ganges opened the scoring, when the centre-forward flicked past the advancing goalkeeper. The School replied through Abbott, J. from a clearance by the goalie, and Jennings from a corner on the right. Abbott, J. from a scramble, scored a third goal, while Marriott, hitting past the advancing goalkeeper, brought the score to 4—1 by half-time. After half-time, Abbott, J., from another muddle, emerged to score a fifth, and Marriott brought the score to 6—1 when he shot into an open goal.

THURSDAY, MARCH 15th.

On a fast, slippery pitch at Culford, another draw resulted, neither side scoring. This being the last match of the season, the team were determined to do well and played hard all through. Culford, strengthened by some first team players, were also determined in their efforts, and a keen, hard-fought game resulted. Culford started as the faster team on the ball and the tackle, but as the School got used to the fast pitch the situation changed; thus a draw was a satisfactory and fair result, although we would have liked to win since they were unbeaten. In the first twenty minutes, Culford attacked repeatedly, but the defence held out; the team gradually settled down and the game evened out by half-time. After the interval both sides attacked but the game remained undecided.

HOCKEY REVIEW.

That this season has been a most successful one, the best since 1912, must be evident from the results. In 1909, hockey was introduced to this School; in 1912, eight out of the ten matches were won; this season ten matches have been played of which five have been won, three drawn, and two lost, with a goal average of 21—14.

From the start, the games have been clean and enjoyable, and have been characterised by enthusiasm, the excellent team spirit which has existed, and the team work which has been gradually built up game by game.

Official team practices, due to the crowded term, could only be held in the first four weeks. Luckily, much of the illness and bad weather which plagues the hockey season was absent, although two good away fixtures, Framlingham and St. John's College, were cancelled.

Since the 2nd XI. is more of a team in which players are tried with a view to the 1st XI. of this and future seasons, only moderate results were obtained. Under the captaincy of M. L. Collier, they played six matches, of which two were won, one drawn and three lost, with a goal average of 17—14. twenty players were tried in the eleven.

The Junior XI. had a very poor season in which they played five, lost four and drew one, with a goal average of 8-19. Looking behind the records, however, at the players themselves, we find much talent there, but whether it will develop remains to be seen.

Congratulations to A. T. B. Gould, who was selected to play for the Combined Suffolk Schools XI. against the County XI.; incidentally they lost 2-7.

Lastly, thanks are due to: Mr. Curd for his advice, Mr. Smeltzer for umpiring most of the 1st. XI. matches, Mr. Bridge for hard work on and off the field, Mr. Warren and his horse for occasional rollings, and, finally, all those who played in the School Eleven for a really enjoyable and successful season.

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- *D. W. MARRIOTT (Captain). Has captained the XI. with enthusiasm and efficiency, and brought out the best in the team. His stick work and sense of positional play have been excellent, whilst his speed has unbalanced opposing defences time and time again.
- *C. R. Jennings (right-half, vice-captain). An exceptionally hard worker who plays an attacking game and supports his forwards with numerous good passes. He never gives up when beaten; for this reason, in every game in which he played, his winger failed to score. He worked well with his back; he might use a little more thought when taking a free hit. With his unbiased views there could not have been a better vice-captain.
- *A. T. B. GOULD (outside-left). He has excellent stickwork, a good eye, and a hard accurate shot from all positions—in fact, most of the assets that go to make a good player. He had four games at centre-forward but was not a hard enough trier and did not worry the defence enough to be successful. The wing, however, gave him room to use his stickwork and speed, and suited his style. Appears to regard centring as a last resort rather than his team duty.
- †R. H. Seddon (right-back). It is strange to reflect that he might never have played in this position, in which he did very well, had it not been for a game last Easter for which he nearly did not turn up. But his play has been determined by the situation; in an easy game his marking has been slack, and he has been an attacking back. Also at times he has tended to wait for an opponent instead of moving into tackle. Has covered and combined very well with his half-back, and, using his hard hit, has wasted no time in clearing from the circle. With good ball control and brainwork he has made effective and useful passes to his forwards.
- †J. A. KOHLER (left-back). He has not come up to expectations, although his timely interceptions have saved us on more than one occassion. His ball control is good. which unfortunately has led him to dribbling excessively; This has kept the game too close and played into the hands of the opponents. Has a powerful flick which he is much too fond of using. He can be relied upon to play a hard game, but will obtain real success only if he deveolps a harder hit and learns when to use it.

- †M. G. Ockendon (goalkeeper). After a poor start he played consistently well; his kicking and hitting, to start with, were at times wild, but improvements were shown game by game. His anticipation, which was very good, caused him to make many saves; his coming out was well judged although he did not smother the ball as well as he might have done. He is not clumsy, but he could be a little more nimble.
- the P. E. Abbott (centre-forward). He is very enthusiastic and a hard trier. He possesses a good eye, a good shot of all types, but he lacks ball control. He uses his wings well in his determined efforts to get his forward line moving. He uses his brain in his play, drawing the defence out of position by interchanging with his forwards. Because of his enthusiasm he is an inspiration to the rest of the team.
- tJ. McM. Abbott (inside-left). He had a poor first game as a winger, but when he was brought into the inside position he developed into a reliable, hardworking player. Has come back well to help his defence, although he should use both hands as much as possible when tackling. Though he is sometimes slow in shooting, he has proved himself to be an opportunist from close range in goalmouth scrimmages. He should try to swing the ball to the opposite wing more often, thus opening out play.
- R. J. Rush (centre-half). He came into the team in the fourth game and has more than justified his inclusion. He stuck closely to his centre-forward who, in the last seven games, scored only three goals. He has a good eye, which has enabled him to intercept passes in front of his opponent; although a little clumsy, he is effective and shows remarkable speed at times. When he is in possession he should clear faster, and attempt to swing the ball to both wings.
- B. A. Rush (left-wing). He has a remarkably good eye, which, although it proved a great asset, probably made him over-confident, causing him to swing wildly at times and miss. He is rather slow, and plays in a manner which makes him appear uninterested. He does not mark as closely as he might and should develop an understanding with his back about covering. Has supported his forwards well, however, and has deserved his place.

H. C. SHELBOURNE (outside-right). Has improved as the season progressed. At the beginning of the season, being rather slow, he appeared to rely on stickwork and "static" play to get him through. In the latter half of the season, however, he became progressive, rounding his opponent very nicely and finishing with a good hard centre. He has a good shot, and works hard when he pleases, but he is easily upset if he is fouled. It is, therefore, essential that he develops speed.

ALSO PLAYED.

- D. M. Kidd (centre-half). Elected Senior member of the Eleven, he did not come up to expectations. He was slow and lazy in his play, and by delaying his passes and clearances he was easily robbed. His hitting, stopping and general play were good, but this helped little without speed and energy.
- D. C. FARROW (right-half). A young player who is on the slow side but who has proved himself a very useful utility half. When playing as a centre-half his marking is good, but as a wing-half is a little slack; he also holds on to the ball a little too long. He has a good eye and uses thought when passing. He will be a great asset next season.
- B. L. Loades (outside-left). He possesses great speed and a good knowledge of wing play; he lacks ball control and thus has dispensed with dribbling to give hard, first-time centres. With more interest in the game he could become a very good winger.
- R. P. DUTTON (inside-left). He is well aquainted with the duties of an inside, but lacks speed and is not a particularly hard worker. He has good stickwork, but he needs to develop a harder shot. His tackling shows little determination and his defensive work does not receive enough attention.
- A. St. J. Jermy (Goalkeeper). Small in stature as he is for a goalkeeper, he is very effective. He does not care what hits him, neither does he appear to mind what he does to others when dealing with an opposing forward. He should come out of his goal less, and time his rushes more accurately. He should steady the ball before attempting to clear, when there is plenty of time. His energy and enthusiasm make his task easier to perform.
