# Headmaster's Notes.

T is very gratifying to learn that the first stage in the building programme for the School will come in the year 1952-3. The plan is that the present Gym. shall be extended considerably in length, which will enable it to be used as an Assembly Hall, and the present Lab. and Lecture Room be converted into Changing Rooms. New laboratory accommodation, together with an Art Room, a Handicraft Room and new Classrooms will be built on a nearby site. This will make it possible to convert the present Schoolroom into a spacious Library and Music Room.

During the past term we have been fortunate enough to acquire an excellent re-conditioned Broadwood Grand—the grant we had for the purpose being supplemented with one hundred pounds which the Minister of Education was induced to release from our "frozen" endowments.

Once again we are grateful for the public spirit of those who are kind enough to undertake the leading role at School functions, and our thanks are extended to General and Lady Gordon-Finlayson for honouring us on Speech Day and to the Hon. Sir Cyril Atkinson and Lady Atkinson for so doing on Founder's Day.

A very good gathering of parents, Old Boys and friends assembled for Sports Day and the programme ran very smoothly, and in excellent weather, in spite of a disastrous morning. Congratulations to P. Abbott and to A. G. Lee, both of whom did well in the Sports, for their continued successes—the former broke the 220 record (15-17) in 24.3 secs. at the Suffolk School Sports and the latter the High Jump record (15-17) at 5 ft. 4\frac{3}{4} ins. Both have been invited to compete in the All-England Schools Sports on July 21st, at Southampton.

We all extend our good wishes to Mr. Martin and Miss Duquemin who were married on July 21st.

And, finally our good wishes go to those who are leaving us this term-may their friendships never be forgotten and may they win all success and happiness.

Congratulations to A. G. Lee on winning the All England High Jump (15-17) at Southampton with a jump of 5 ft. 5 ins., and to P. Abbott on reaching the semi-final of the 220.

# Speech Day, June 28th, 1951.

The importance of a decision being reached early about a career after a boy left school was stressed by Gen. Sir Robert Gordon-Finlayson, K.C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., at the Speech Day proceedings in the Athenæum.

The speaker told the boys how important it was for them to realise early what they wanted to do, and for them to discuss the matter with their parents and masters.

Sir Robert urged his audience to be proud of themselves, proud of their school, proud of their parents, and proud of their country. If a boy had these ideals, and was a pupil of a good school such as this, he should get on very well.

The speaker thought that the happiest time was when a scholar left school . . began to struggle to get his feet on the ground, and to expedite his own ideas.

He continued: "The first thing you should feel in your bones is that progress is always with you and you must progress and not let your minds stand still. Think ahead and plan ahead if you don't want to be overtaken."

Personal success was not everything in life, said Sir Robert. This alone would mean that their lives would be very empty, and he thought very miserable.

Personal success was to be encouraged, however, because it led a person into a position where he could help others less fortunate than himself. He could also help his country in many ways.

# Founder's Day, July 5th, 1951.

Former Justice of the High Court, the Hon. Sir Cyril Atkinson, Ll.D., made an eloquent plea for the practice of the Christian life when he gave the address at the Founder's Day service in the Cathedral.

Among those present were the Mayor and Mayoress of Bury (Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Bennett), and the Right Hon. Sir John Tilley, a former Comptroller of the School.

Sir Cyril said there could be scarcely a phase of sin and suffering with which he had not had to deal during his professional career as a lawyer and a judge. Always he had striven to get to the cause and the root of the evil done.

"As I draw to the end of a crowded life," he continued, "I ask myself what is the most important thing in man's life? My answer is his relationship to God; his realisation of his dependence upon God. Would that I had realised that at schoolboy age.,,

"With all the experience of nearly 80 years of life I tell you this: that to try and live the Christian life, the true inward Christian life, without the power of Christ within you is to try the impossible. When I have been trying a difficult case and I could not see a clear solution, I have put the puzzle to God; suddenly I have seen the answer—how I must decide. Build up the character of your soul by the power of Christ within you and you will spend eternity with God. Believe me—I beg you to believe me—there is no other way."

# Easter Journey, 1951.

The London party and the Bury party having joined at Rugby without loss, we arrived at Kendal in the first sunshine which some had seen for quite a while. On Tuesday, the 10th of April, we had our first "shake-down" walk along a limestone cliff, known as Scout Scar. It appeared that in going along the cliff edge we passed the body of a gentleman who, the previous evening, had literally and spiritually passed over, but we proceeded without loss.

Leaving Kendal by bus the next day for Grasmere, and having dumped our packs, we set out for the stiffish climb of Helvellyn via Dollywaggon Pike. Here we had our first encounter proper with snow.

Next day, after a most enjoyable walk along the Lakes Grasmere and Rydal Water, we arrived at Ambleside where we had the first of a series of primitive football matches in which the best side invariably lost.

On Friday, April the 13th, we had our first encounter with a "clearing shower" on our way over Greenup Edge where, in places, less fortunate members of the expedition came into violent contact with a mass of soggy mud and plants into which they sank in various undignified postures.

The "clearing shower" experienced here could not, however, compare with the one we met over Honister Pass two days later. Mr. Smeltzer having assured us that the torrential downpour was only a "clearing shower," we set out. After five miles we were soaked to the skin and, despite the cheering influence of songs like, "April Showers," and "Join the Army," we were forced to turn back. Suffice it to say that at nine that evening the "clearing shower" was giving no signs of clearing.

The following day we set out to climb Skiddaw, which is the highest of the northerly mountains of the Lake District. The two ladies were not with us on this occasion, having gone to Keswick where we met them later. Half-way up Skiddaw we had our dinner near a small white hut where a man lived during the summer season selling refreshments. We were the first people he had seen for a week. He had no wireless and it seemed that his only companion was a tame sheep. Having consumed our lunches, which took some time, we continued and reached the top. Here in the distance we could see the foothills of Scotland, but there was a very strong wind and the top was very icy.

On our last day in the Lake District a straggling member of our number was lost in the thickly wooded area of Thirlmere, and it was not until our luncheon was disturbed by a faint call from afar that he was seen at the top of a cliff about a quarter of a mile away.

Next day we started home, but not before we had previously sewn up our leader's pyjama trousers and powdered his bed liberally with talcum powder.

#### CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- \*J. A. Kohler (captain). Without undue ostentation he has led the team through a successful season and as batsman and fielder he has set them a good example; he must, however, learn the importance of maintaining control of his players when they are winning easily. Off the field, the season was too well advanced before he organised nets and rolling duties, but once started he had them carried out efficiently.
- \*R. H. SEDDON (vice-captain). The finest batsman in the team. Scores fast and is delightful to watch. This season he has developed into a medium pace opening bowler and has captured many good wickets. His fielding has been excellent.
- \*A. T. B. GOULD. It was not until late in the season that he came up to expectations with two fine fifties. His services as a bowler have been small compared with last year, and he must be more active in the field.

- \*M. L. COLLIER. Although clumsy as a fielder and unreliable as a batsman, he has been very valuable to the team as a left arm fast bowler. His bowling has been of consistently good length and shows much promise.
- \*H. C. Shelbourne. A steady batsman who has been most useful in the middle of the batting order. In the field he gathers the ball well, but throwing in is rather wild.
- †R. J. Rush. Previously only a moderately good bowler he has now become an effective hard-hitting batsman who has played some very good innings. His fielding has been consistently good.
- B. L. LOADES. He has proved himself to be a good, agile wicket-keeper, but unfortunately he has very little batting power.
- J. H. Burrows. He has been our best slow bowler with his accurate and good length left arm deliveries. Sight, however, handicaps both his fielding and batting.
- C. R. Jennings. Half way through the season he was given an opportunity as a 1st XI. batsman and took it admirably. His fielding has room for considerable improvement.

## C.C.J. Rotes.

In the early part of the term we were assisted for three weeks by Nine Travelling Wing, who once again conducted a short Instructors' Course for Post Certificate N.C.Os., and Cadets, and also helped with ceremonial training. The value of these visits was evident when the Contingent was inspected on June 26th by Lt.-Colonel E. P. V. This should have good results in team shooting next year. Forty Cadets qualified as First Class Shots, and sixteen of these obtained Marksmen's Badges awarded by the National Small Bore Rifle Association.

## C.C.J. Camp, 1951.
