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Headmaster's Notes

WE have now introduced a pocket Almanack which will be available at the beginning of each term, at a cost of sixpence, and which will cover the whole of the School's activities for that term. We hope that it will be used not only by boys but by parents, and that the mention of an activity will be taken as a direct and personal invitation to Royalist and Foreigner, to one and all, to participate.

We are very grateful to Mr. Smeltzer not only for his active work in connection with the Debating Society but for the variation he has introduced by the showing of a number of most interesting geographical films. It is most unfortunate, however, that so many boys are unable to attend because of 'bus difficulties.

The release of a modest part of our Endowment Income has put at our disposal an increased amount for Games Travel—a big item these days, but a most important one—a sum of money for educational films, and a further sum for general educational activities. From the latter we have purchased a splendid Record Player, which gives perfect reproduction, and a very considerable number of long-playing records. Within the year we hope to have something that may claim to be a library of records which will be available in out-of-school time too. This term, on two Mondays after school, we have heard the whole of the music of "Iolanthe" and "The Pirates of Penzance," while on other occasions we have had Beethoven's Seventh Symphony, two Brandenburg Concertos of Bach, Beethoven's "Emperor" Concerto and the Eroica Symphony.

It is good to hear of the extended activities of the Old Burians' Association. We hope that every boy will in time join the Association, and that its activities may flourish. Such an Association is vital to a School's health and well-being.

Our Visit to Norway

AUGUST, 1953

Our party assembled at Bury on Friday, August 7th, and departed by coach for Peterborough and the train to Newcastle. We sailed at five o'clock on the "Venus," an impressive ship, and after the excitement caused by Mr. Smeltzer espying his parents on Tynemouth Pier we settled down to a calm crossing.

The following morning proved to be bright and thus we had a good view of the Norwegian coast. Waiting for us was a 'bus which was to take us inland to Ulvik on a most eventful journey, for not only was the road as narrow as any country lane, but it curved so fantastically and there were such precipitous drops at the side that it seemed impossible that anyone could navigate it properly. But all was well and we sat back to enjoy the grandeur of the scenery and the friendliness of the Norwegians—represented by hordes of waving females. However, after the 'bus had passed through a tunnel and broken two windows, the engine refused to take us further. When the driver had sworn—in Norwegian—and expressed—in English—his desire to immerse the thing in a fjord, we disembarked and waited for further transport to take us to our hotel, "Ulvik Pensjonat," where we were extremely well looked after.

Nearby was a small fleet of rowing boats and one of our first efforts was to row across the fjord—in a somewhat unorthodox manner—to visit a horticultural college.

Our guide, Olaf, a very likeable person, secured for us, after some haggling, a motor boat to take us to the neighbouring village of Osa, a trip characterised by the unsuccessful attempt of one member of the party to extend himself with hands on the quay and his feet in the boat. A somewhat bedraggled human being offered full scope for our amateur photographers.

In a country that is full of swift flowing streams and jagged steep-sided mountains, waterfalls abound, and we visited the awe-inspiring Voringfoss, 527 feet high.

Wednesday, August 12th, saw us visiting a mountain dairy farm, before climbing to the snowline at 3000 feet where the scenery was breath-taking. Next day we travelled along

the Bergen-Oslo railway to Finse, four thousand feet up in the mountains before walking three miles to a glacier. Getting on to it presented some difficulty, for it seemed to be cut off by a stream of ice-cold water fresh from the glacier. But most of us succeeded, and cameras were very busy,

But at last the day of departure came, and, having travelled up the Floien cogwheel railway to gain a magnificent view of Bergen in the setting sun, we boarded the "Venus" and sailed at 11.30 p.m., to encounter some very rough weather which duly took its toll.

We reached Newcastle early on Monday morning, hastily sought news of the final Test Match, and then entrained for home. Once again Mr. Smeltzer had given us a most successful holiday abroad and we offer him our sincere thanks.

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- *J. CADDY (captain). Has played hard and has scored some excellent goals. His speed and ball control make him a valuable inside-forward. His captaincy has been disappointing. He has introduced few ideas to strengthen an unsuccessful team and his leadership has not been inspiring. It may be conceded that on the field his task has not been eased by an over vociferous vice-captain.
- *D. C. FARROW (inside-left). (vice-captain). Has played consistently well throughout the season, although at times he tends to hold the ball too long. Has a strong shot in either foot and is very fast.
- *D. W. JONES (left-back). A steady player who has been very consistent. His heading and positional play have been very good, but his kicking has been erratic on occasions.
- †P. J. FARTHING (centre-half). Started the season well below his standard of last season but improved steadily and gave several very good performances indeed. Must mark his centre-forward more closely.
- †D. G. SOUTHGATE (right-wing). A very good ball player who has shown great tenacity. His shooting is rather weak.

- †T. J. SOAMES (goal-keeper). Has played some good games, especially towards the end of the season. He tends to let some of the more easy shots through.
- †K. L. RUSH (left wing). His games have been very varied. His shooting is good but he tends to shoot too much rather than centre to his other forwards.
- I. S. DAVIDSON (right-back). His tackling is good but he tends to mis-kick when clearing. His positional play is very good.
- R. E. ADDIS (left-half). His heading has been excellent and he shows great keenness. He is rather slow. Has a very powerful kick.
- D. I. SMITH (right-half). He has played quite well throughout the season. He supports the forwards very well and tries hard.
- M. C. LAMBOURNE (centre-forward). Lacks speed but plays well with the other forwards. His shooting is rather erratic on occasions. His passing and ball control improved throughout the season.

- B. BURROWS (right-back). Lacks speed but has a strong clearance and tries hard.
- P. BEATTY (right-wing). Centres well and is very fast. He lacks ball control but tries hard.
- J. L. WEARN (right-half). His play is very varied. His heading and kicking are weak and he does not make full use of his speed. His tackling can be very good.

C.C.F. Notes

Twenty recruits were enrolled in September, and there are now fifty-two members of the Contingent—a slight increase on the total last term.

Work started in earnest at the beginning of the term on the syllabus for the Certificate "A" Examinations due to be held at the end of March, 1954. No. 9 Travelling Wing paid us four weekly visits in October, providing a short Methods of Instruction Course for Post Certificate N.C.O.'s, and a series of lessons on Section Leading and Fieldcraft for the Certificate "A," Part 2 Class. A new Signals Instructor was appointed to the Suffolk Yeomanry during the Summer holidays, and the Post Certificate N.C.O.'s have been able to commence their Signals training at the King's Road Barracks.

One Field Day was held on November 17th, at Fornham Park, under the direction once again of Lt.-Col. K. J. K. Pye, O.C. 4th Battalion, The Suffolk Regiment. The dense fog, which at first seemed likely to spoil the day, provided a touch

of realism for a scheme of Fighting Patrols, and we experienced a somewhat damp, but very successful exercise. For the first time since the Signals Platoon was formed, wireless sets were used in the field to enable the patrols to keep in touch with their bases. With little or no instruction as yet on the sets, the N.C.O.'s responsible did an excellent job in getting them going and keeping them going during the exercise. Those in charge of the Patrols were equally successful in keeping their rather unwieldy Patrols together in very difficult conditions, with visibility at times reduced to a few yards, in spite of the fact that nearly half were recruits who had had only six weeks' cadet training.
