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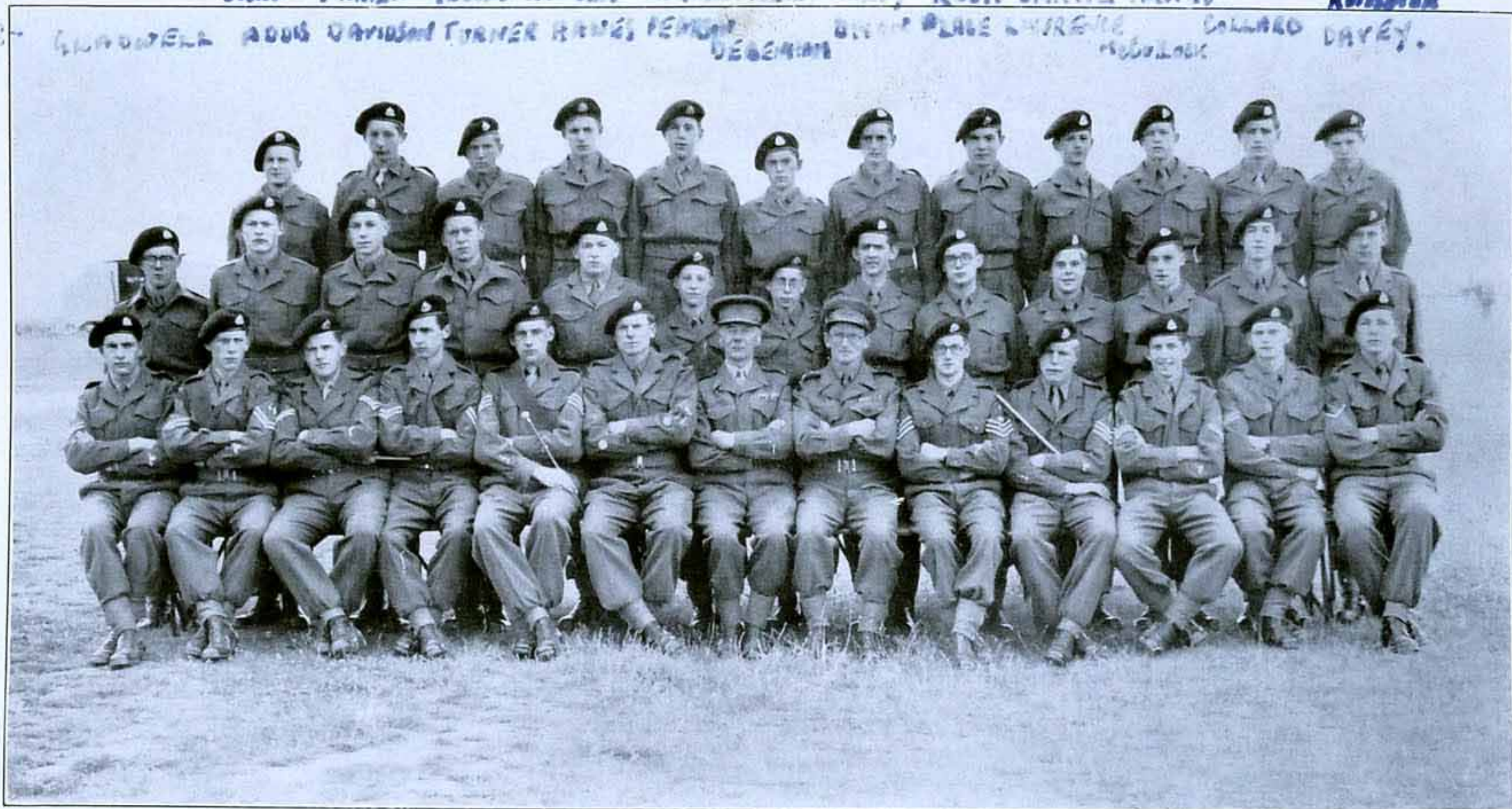

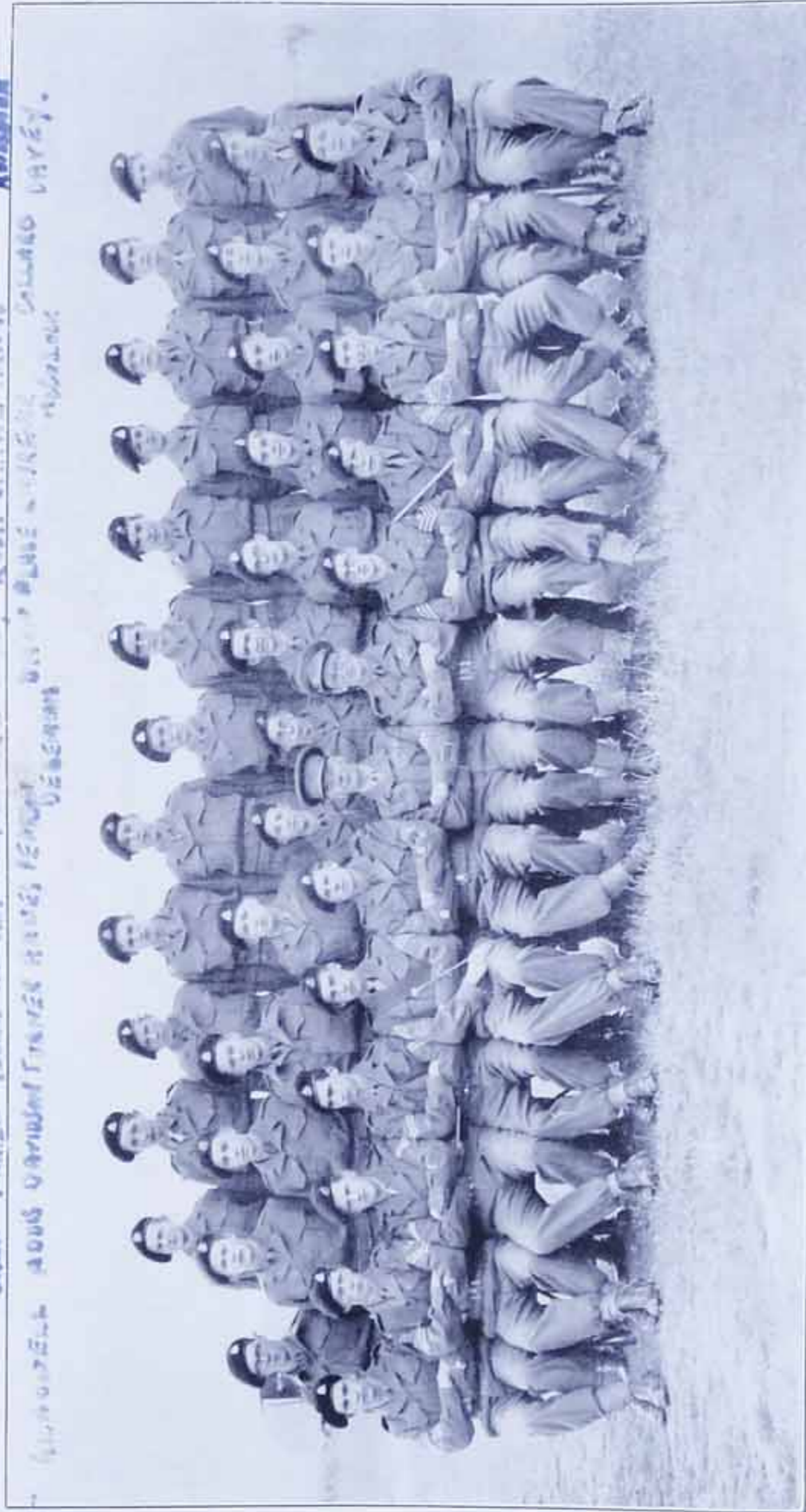

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

*D. C. FARROW (capt.) In his second year as captain the School had a rather poor season. He himself again proved unreliable as a batsman, and indeed in six matches at one stage only scored four runs, though in his last three innings he showed himself, given some luck, to be an effective forcing player. His bowling was very useful to the side, and he set a good example in the field, but one felt that his loss of form and confidence in mid-term was reflected in the team's performances, and that he too readily allowed the side to become dispirited when games were being lost.

*D. G. SOUTHGATE. A good all rounder who has been very successful with both bat and ball. As an opening batsman, although slow in scoring, he has played many valuable innings. He is also a spin bowler who has varied his speed with great success, taking many good wickets. His fielding is generally good.

*D. J. SIMPKIN (wicket-keeper). A wicket-keeper-batsman who has been very successful. As an opening batsman he has done very well, although not a fast scorer, he punished the loose ball. At the beginning of the season he became the 1st XI. wicket-keeper, a position more or less new to him, but one that he has filled fairly successfully.

*M. Q. SHELBOURNE. A fast bowler who, although not quite so successful as he was last season, has bowled well. He has increased in speed and has been used as our stock bowler. His fielding has been spasmodic. He has taken

several excellent catches but sometimes he appears to lose concentration. As a batsman he is capable of scoring runs and is not afraid to hit out.

†D. W. JONES (vice-capt). He started the season very well as a batsman but fell off later. A very good fielder and a fine team player. He can be a useful slow bowler but he has not been used very much this season.

K. L. RUSH. A forcing bat who can usually be relied upon to score some runs at a fast rate if needed. As a fielder he has done very well, taking many good catches. He can also bowl, but has had few chances to show his effectiveness.

C. L. A. MOORE. Came into the 1st XI. halfway through the season after doing very well in the 2nd XI. As a batsman he has been successful, excelling when the odds were against him. He fielded for most of the season at cover-point, where he saved many runs.

M. C. LAMBOURNE. Another player who was promoted to the 1st XI. half-way through the season. Although not very successful at batting he played a few innings which were valuable to the side. His fielding was generally good.

K. J. ELLIS. A young player who has been successful as a bowler. At the moment he tends to drop the ball short, which is expensive, but he will be very useful in years to come. His batting has yet to mature.

C. SMITH. Another young player who, although not outstanding, shows signs of becoming a very useful cricketer. If he concentrated more when fielding he could become very good at it.

I. S. DAVIDSON. A bowler who has met with limited success this season. On occasions he has bowled very well but he tends to bowl short of a length. His fielding has been good, whereas his batting has been very disappointing.

CRICKET REVIEW.

C.C.F. Notes.

The important event this term, as usual in the Summer, was the Annual Inspection, carried out on June 29th by Colonel R. E. Osborne-Smith, D.S.O., O.B.E., Commander of the East Anglian Brigade. We received a good report from the Inspecting Officer, who commented particularly on the keenness of the Cadet N.C.O.'s instructing the various training squads, and the general turn-out. The full issue of modern type Battle Dress during the year has undoubtedly greatly increased the general smartness of the whole Contingent, and this was very noticeable at Camp.

A Map Exercise was held on May 27th, and a Field Exercise on July 20th, at which we were joined by the C.C.F. Contingent of King's School, Ely. Lt.-Col. K. J. K. Pye, O.C. 4th Battalion The Suffolk Regiment, once again took charge of operations, and at the end gave us a very clear and lucid picture of the "battle," which so often seems to the contestants to be chaotic and inconclusive. Wireless sets proved useful in enabling the Company and Platoon Commanders to keep in touch with their scattered commands.

The Signals Section has been able to function much more satisfactorily this year. Three Cadets attended a Signals Course at Colchester in April and passed the Classification Tests there, and two more passed on July 19th at the School. We have now a small number of Signals Instructors available to start the new Signals specialists on their training.

Shooting has been carried on to a limited extent at Gibraltar Barracks, and all Cadets completed the Weapon Training Course. This year we were able to spend two half-days on the .303 Ranges at Camp and for the first time for many years most of those eligible to fire completed the Classification Tests for full bore shooting.
