Headmaster's Notes

WERY crowded Summer Term has come to its end, with our own Athletic Sports, the District Sports, the Suffolk Sports, together with, for three of our boys, the all-England Sports at Southampton. Add to these the production of "Reluctant Heroes," the C.C.F. Inspection, together with Founder's Day and Speech Day and, to conclude with, four and a half weeks of general Certificate Examinations and it will be seen that the demands on all have been heavy.

It will, I think, be apparent from the Athletics results that the School will soon be a great force to be reckoned with and that many more School records will be broken in the next few years. Unfortunately, it is hard to do justice both to Athletics and Cricket and when we are able to offer boys vastly increased opportunities for swimming the situation will become even more complicated. That situation will probably arise next summer.

It is hoped to have a swimming pool of seventy five feet by thirty feet, dropping from three feet depth to four over the first forty feet, giving ample accommodation for non-swimmers to practise, and a further three feet in the remaining thirty-five.

Once again the Cadet Corps did well on Inspection Day and it was encouraging to have a report which commented on its enthusiasm and efficiency.

We were exceedingly fortunate to have such a distinguished man, and so fine a preacher, as Canon M. S. Stancliffe at our Founder's Day service. Rector of St. Margaret's and Canon of Westminster, Canon Stancliffe must have many calls on his time and, indeed, he was teaching in Westminster School immediately before catching the train to come to us. The service itself was taken by an old Boy, the Rev. J. R. M. Wright, and once again our old friend Mr. Hallam was at the organ. The singing of the Choir, and of the whole School, very rightly earned a great deal of praise.

We have had many good speakers at the School's Speech Day, but I doubt whether any has spoken with more sincerity and charm than Lt.-Col. C. P. Anderson, Officer Commanding 1st Bn. The Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. After the speeches a large number of parents and friends saw the Old Boys' Cricket Match, work going on in the Lab., an excellent Art Display and Miss Kilpatrick's menagerie. In the evening the Old Boys' Dinner was held at Everard's. The only un-

fortunate feature of the whole day was the breakdown in the relay system and, whilst most of the parents found seats in the Gym to hear the Speakers, only a fraction of the School did so.

With the end of term a party went off to Ludgershall to C.C.F. Camp and a small party of Scouts went camping in Derbyshire, whilst some twenty-five boys awaited their trip to France and of course, there was the usual exodus of senior boys from our midst, P. H. Turner holding the record of having been at the School for twelve years. All carry with them our very best wishes for the future.

We, in the meanwhile, make preparations for some seventy new boys in September.

THE JOHN GREENE BOWL-

At "The Old Vic"

"ANTONY AND CLEOPATRA."

On Thursday, May 2nd, members of the VI form English Literature group went to the "Old Vic" Theatre, to see the Helpmann production of "Antony and Cleopatra." The Old "Vic" was heavily damaged during the war, but has undergone extensive re-construction. Despite its unimposing exterior, the inside of the theatre is striking in its blend of comfort - even opera-glasses were supplied. A large chandelier, with lampshades reminding us of the "good old days" of gaslight, when the "Old Vic" was a Music Hall, hung from the ceiling.

When the curtain rose, the first impression we had was one of light and depth. An expressive and imaginative set gave us the idea of luxury and elegance. A background of deep sky-blue was shrouded round with gold and yellow draperies, and in the foreground stood two masive columns. Throughout the play, the set, which seldom varied, was always interesting, always in keeping.

The characters were, on the whole, well-defined, but they must be subject to some criticism. Cleopatra looked as much like an Egyptain Queen as a Chinese woman resembles an English housewife. Her skin was of the purest whitestrange, considering that one of the actors commented that Antony's eyes

"Now bend, now turn, upon a tawny front."

The majority of us felt that Cleopatra's "infinite variety" was not adequately portrayed. The part was a difficult one, and although Cleopatra (Margaret Whiting) gave a fairly convincing performance, yet she lacked much of the essential vitality which goes to make Shakespeare's Egyptian Queen.

Antony, on the other hand, performed with great zest and feeling for his part. His sensuality, his resolution and nobility, were conveyed to us in a very vivid manner by Keith Michell.

Enobarbus played an important minor role in a novel fashion. He was supposed to be the rather cynical shadow of Antony. His cynicism, for the most part, fell into the background, to give way to a very English joviality. His experiment was, however, a success.

David Dodimead, Caesar's understudy, had to replace the advertised Caesar, who was ill. He is to be congratulated upon a performance of dignity and aloofness which carried considerable power.

Octavia, whom we had imagined as a thin dark tower of patient virture and faith, was found to be a cheerful, blonde, good-looking little Saxon, while the "Yokel" was a rather slyly intelligent fellow, well-versed in the "dance macabre" which Mr. Helpmann, himself a ballet-dancer, must needs introduce.

The dialogue was always clearly audible, and the action never dragged. Cleopatra died sitting on a throne, a magnificent figure in her golden robes, inside her "monument,"

The whole performance was excellent, and as we all agreed, worth the somewhat grubby second-class train journey both ways.

"RICHARD III"

"Richard III" is the 32nd production in the "Old Vic" Plan inaugurated in 1953 for the presentation of all the 36 plays in the First Folio of Shakespeare. It was the good fortune of the English Literature Groups of Form VI to see this production in London on June 1st, and a very memorable production it proved to be. It was distinguished by many remarkable strokes of imagination and orginality in the set, décor, and costumes: as, for instance, when the doomed Hastings sat at the head of a blood-red-draped council table, cut away sharply into exaggerated perspective so that it appeared like a scarlet-palled coffin or catafalque, and behind him in shadow stood four halberdiers, motionless, holding dim-burning torches, which suggested tall, requiem-candles. Again, the splendour and colour of the Court scene at the death of Edward IV can never be forgotten.

But all revolved round Robert Helpmann as Richard of Gloucester. The subtlety of this portrayal was truly remarkable, and for some of us proved more absorbing than that of Olivier in the film. Helpmann's Richard had a conscience, but he stifled it in his delight at his own success in the techniques of evil-doing. Now and again, however, conscience struggled to the fore, and at the end of the play triumphed in his downfall.

To pay tribute to the excellence of all the supporting cast would take too much space, but mention must be made of the remarkable, Nemesis-like portrayal of Queen Margaret by Fay Compton. The influence of Helpmann's experience in ballet was seen in the choreographic impression of the ghosts around Richard's and Richmond's beds on the night before Bosworth Field.

No one who saw it will soon forget this production which gave all keen Shakespeare students much food for thought.

Athletic Sports

The School Sports were held on Thursday the 6th June and proved to be both enjoyable and entertaining due to the combination of fine weather and, in certain instances, the ability of the competitors.

The Inter-House Challenge Bowl was won by the Yorkist House, who are to be congratulated on winning the trophy for the 2nd year in succession.

The general standard of performance was quite encouraging although only a few boys had trained seriously for their events. It is only with training, which includes constant practice as well as the correct technique, that good results will ever be obtained. This was proved by the seven boys who, between them, broke ten school records, a notable example being R. L. Flack's record time of 2 minutes 21.2 secs. for the under 15 Half-Mile, a deserved success for his conscientious training.

P. H. Turner, School Javelin, also did well with a throw of 138-ft. 11-inches, beating the five-year old record by over 16-ft.

In the under 15 age group, P. W. Garrard broke the discus record by nearly 30-ft., establishing it at 112-ft. 8½ inches. The general standard in this comparatively new school event is encouraging.

In the junior group, where generally enthusiasm far exceeds ability, there are boys who should prove competent athletics in future years, the best being K. Lane, D. Bidwell, T. Gerkin, T. G. Edwards and R. F. Bridges.

In conclusion, the 1957 Sports gave cause for some satisfaction, especially in the Middle and Lower school, although the general apathy of a large proportion of the senior school does not augur well for the immediate future.







CRICKET REVIEW

After last seasons great success, this terms record can only be described as moderate, the team having won four matches, drawn six, and lost four. However, the 1st eleven has experienced many exciting, hard fought conflicts, made more enjoyable by the absence of overwhelming defeats and victories. This year's eleven has been particularly outstanding in that it has consisted of all-rounders'; in fact, one defect of the team has been the comparative lack of specialists.

The batting this season has not been especially strong, although a number of reasonably high totals have been scored. The various opening partnerships rarely reached the

standard required, and the majority of the runs were scored by the later batsmen. Unlike the batting, the bowling has rested mainly on the shoulders of the veterans in the team. Although there is a tendancy to bowl short, the bowling has on most occasions been exceptionaly tight and accurate. Mendham seemed to improve with every match, and received admirable support from the other fast bowler, Johnston. On changing his pace to slow medium, Davidson immediately met with considerable success; and Hopwood, when entrusted with the ball, proved to be a stock bowler of some ability.

Fielding has improved throughout the season, and each player was made to realise its great importance, especially after the School's defeat at Thetford. Davidson was always outstanding in the field, and few chances escaped his hands. Hopwood also showed great agility, while Proctor's exhibitions behind the stumps were always consistent.

Perhaps the most pleasing result of the season has been the future promise revealed in Overall, Dickerson and Reed. The latter, probably the most diminutive player seen on the square for many years, has proved to be a sound batsman, exceptionally strong on the legside.

The 2nd XI. has had rather an uneventful season, but the Under 14 XI. has met with considerable success, and such a team should develop into an extremely promising 1st XI in future years.

Finally we are grateful to Mr. Dart for the excellent fixture list, and to Wyard for his preparation of such first class pitches.

C.C.F. Rotes

Apart from three visits by instructors of the Travelling Wing and by Sergeant Butcher (Signals), there has been no assistance from the Regular Army this term. The bulk of the instruction has therefore fallen upon the senior N.C.O's.

The main event of the term has been the Annual Inspection, carried out this year by Brigadier C. H. Barnett, Director of Transportation, the War Office. The preparations for Camp involve a certain amount of paper work which would not be appreciably increased if the whole Contingent were to attend. I should very much like to see many more Cadets at Camp in future years: Camp combines a cheap holiday, plenty of fresh air and exercise, and, in most subjects, more valuable and interesting training than can be achieved in term time.

The programme for the last term has been a varied one but the emphasis has been on preparation for the District Camp. 150 Scouts from the District camped in the Abbey Gardens on 29th–30th June to commemorate B.P's. Centenary and the Jubilee of Scouting. The School Troop was represented by Goodwin, Sharp, Death, Challacombe, Turner, Blake, Morrey, Rhodes and Bowers under the able leadership of Crick as Acting S.M.


Once again Bob-a-Job week was very successful and the sum of £12 Os. 3d. was raised, an average of about 10/-each.

The choice of "Reluctant Heroes," a farce by Colin Morris, was in deliberate contrast to the previous production of "Macbeth." Morris lightly caricatures the history of the first few weeks of Army life as experienced by three National Servicemen, and their mutual impact on one another, and on their sergeant. The author, himself an ex-Commando, has drawn his characters boldly, leaving no doubt in the minds of the actors as to the types they are to portray.

The tyrannical but eloquent Sergeant Bell, played by Malcolm Tipper, swaggered martially through all three Acts. He maintained his vigorous and credible portrayal of the Sergeant, despite considerable vocal strain in the evening resulting from hard work earlier in the day during "dress rehearsals."

We welcome a newcomer to the Society in J. Hayward, who played Trooper Morgan, one of the more difficult parts in the play. How well he showed his audience that many an unwritten line can be conveyed by acting with the eyes alone! His mild Cockney accent was convincing, although occasional fragments of speech were inaudible at the back of the auditorium.

Previous portrayals of a stern and thwarted spinster, and of the evil power behind the murdering hand of Macbeth were in great contrast to Brian Hazel's present personification of the deferred public schoolboy. As Trooper Tone, he ably counterbalanced the rustic simplicity of Gregory, and maintained his air of superiority throughout the play. In this performance he showed much greater self-confidence and stage presence than hitherto.

Described as an awkward, slow-thinking Lancashire workman, unhappy in his new career, Trooper Gregory was adequately characterised by Michael West, who obviously revelled in the well-defined role. Clear dication and a consistent accent helped in no little way to make this a very satisfactory and enjoyable performance.

Whilst the main burden of the play rested on the shoulders of these four main characters, mention must be made of certain actors taking the smaller parts. In particular, Colin Bailey is to be commended for his lively portrayal of the dapper Captain Percy, and Richard Downing showed enthusiasm for the liberal use of the rather odd equipment of

the medical orderly. As in "Macbeth," the part played by the stage staff was of no little importance. J. Crick as stage manager excelled himself in the smooth organisation of an efficient team of stage hands who were set the problem of rigging the curtains, erecting the stage, and effecting a difficult change of set for Act III. One of the greatest improvements on previous productions was the use of a stage, and we are especially grateful to Mr. Stanley Palmer for the loan.

The Relay team of Miles, Halls, King and Whiting won the Inter-School Challenge Cup in a most convincing manner.

As a result of our fine showing in the District Sports, 22 boys were selected to represent West Suffolk in the County Sports held at Newmarket on Saturday the 15th June and they made a notable contribution to West Suffolk's victory in these sports.

There were three individual winners, Hooper, under 15 Hop-Step-Jump, Whistlecraft, under 15 Long Jump, and Miles, Intermediate Hop-Step-Jump. All three were subsequently chosen to represent Suffolk in the All England Sports at Southampton in July. Miles in particular deserves a mention for his Hop-Step-Jump of 40 ft. 10 inches which is the first time 40 ft. has been beaten by a schoolboy in Suffolk. A very creditable performance. Hooper's jump of 39 ft. 2 inches bears favourable comparision in the under 15 age group. We wish all three every success in their efforts at Southampton.

Swimming Activity

The extremely warm weather has made swimming a popular activity this term, and while the general standard is very low, there are a few boys who show promise. A West Suffolk Swimming Association was formed during the term with the idea of entering boys in the Suffolk County Gala. Eight boys were nominated for the trials, from which five were selected.

Chess Club

The Summer Term has seen a great reduction in numbers, but several new players have joined the Junior section, and their enthusiasm promises well for the future. A small Tournament was held about half-way through the term, Le Seeleur winning the final round. As a relaxation from serious chess we have played one or two games of Lightning Chess, Two-Move Chess, Losing Chess, and even a Kriegspiel, which caused much hilarity to players and spectators but could not be finished.
