Headmaster's Motes.

I is, no doubt, a matter of conjecture as to what the School's future status will be under the Education Act. The Governors of the School have made application for continued recognition as a Direct Grant School, that is to say, for permission to continue as we are at present.

The Headmaster of Culford School, Dr. J. W. Skinner, M.A., at their recent Speech Day made public that in the event of this country being invaded during the past few years we should have moved as quickly as possible across country to accept the shelter so generously offered by Culford to our Boarders. I do not intend to narrate the preparation that had to go on behind the scenes, even to the obtaining and safe keeping of a military pass permitting us to pass the military defences at any time, but I do want to stress how appreciative we are of the grand way in which Dr. Skinner made us feel that a heart-warming welcome would await us. We shall ever remember our debt.

It is encouraging to note that this autumn six hundred Arts students of scholarship standard will have their military service deferred in order that they may commence Arts courses at the Universities.

The School is suffering a severe loss at the end of this term in the departure of many senior boys: the Head Boy, A. R. Thomson, who has proved himself such a tower of strength, has been accepted as a student at Faraday House; F. B. Gow, another excellent School Prefect, will enter the Services. Two other School Prefects, C. A. H. Hodge and C. J. W. Gilbert, who have proved equally outstanding, will pass on to the Universities, the former to Edinburgh, the latter to Manchester. D. Savill and E. H. Pask, two recently created School Prefects, will also leave, Savill hoping to go to Cambridge University, Pask entering the Bank of England. P. J. G. Barnett will study Aeronautical Engineering at Loughborough College, and J. H. Asquith will study Chemistry

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- *F. B. Gow has been the Captain this year of a team having no "old colours" to strengthen it and he has been most successful in building up a good eleven. He has not had a great variety of bowling to play with but he has managed his limited supply well, and has himself done a lion's share. Gow is a good medium fast right-hand bowler with a fairly steady length. As a batsman he has done good service, although most of his runs are scored by unorthodox strokes. His fielding has always been keen and an inspiration to the others and that has had much to do with the Team's success.
- *A. B. ROOD (Vice-Captain). Has proved his worth behind the stumps and with his bat, but is spoilt by impetuosity.
- *J. SYRETT. He has been the mainstay of the team on several occasions with his consistent bowling and careful, stylish batting.
- *A. R. THOMSON. An aggressive batsman who has had some success, though he sometimes hits at the wrong ball. His fielding is inconsistent.
- [†]J. F. FORDHAM. Outstanding for his fine fielding in any position. Has a good eye, and as he has improved his style of batting he has made some high scores.
- †A. F. JENNINGS. One of the enthusiasts of the team; he is a useful batsman, but would be better if he could develop a leg shot.
- †J. V. HUGHES. Fills any position adequately and has produced some useful scores, though he suffers from lack of confidence in his own abilities.
- B. J. W. GILBERT. A valuable member of the team, for he uses his hands to good purpose in the outfield. His batting is too unorthodox to produce big scores.
- A. L. R. DAVIES. A very fair bat, spoilt by inconsistency.
 Also he is hesitant in his fielding.
- R. Pask. Could be one of the best bowlers in the team.

The Young Farmers' Club.

This term the members have had a very interesting time in picking five boys to represent the Club at the Coldham Hall Agricultural Show on the 7th July.

At the Show the Club had to be represented by a team of three boys of any age, and by two individuals, one over 14 and one under 14 years of age. The team members were picked after a series of trial judging competitions. The first trial was at Mr. Stanley Cross's Farm at Ixworth, where he and Mr. Sayce had arranged for Mr. Macdonald, the War Agricultural Executive Committee's Animal Husbandry Officer, to go over the "points" of Red Poll Cattle, using one of Mr. Cross's prize Cows as a model. Later four Red Poll Cows were paraded and inspected by all members and placed in order, with reasons given for this placing.

The next visit was to the Westley Hall Farm where Large White Pigs, belonging to Mr. Burrell, were seen. Here several groups of four Sows were placed by the boys after Mr. Macdonald had gone over the "points."

The last trial was at Mrs. Heilgers' Farm, just beyond Ixworth, where Friesians were seen and placed in order, with reasons given.

The results of these three trials having been considered, the team was chosen as follows:—Marfleet, Hunter, and Shelbourne, and the individuals were Leeks (under 14) and Baker (over 14). These five boys visited Mr. Oliver's Farm at Hawstead to see Suffolk Punches and to be instructed by our new President, Mr. Oliver.

On the 7th July the five boys judged Red Poll Cattle, Friesians, and Large White Pigs, at Mr. Ince's Farm at Shimpling in the morning, and the Horses in the ring at Coldham Hall in the afternoon.

Seven Y.F.C. teams competed and our team was placed 2nd. Leeks also won the 2nd place for individual judging under 14, and Baker the 4th place over 14.

The successes gained were largely due to the excellent instruction given by Mr. Macdonald and Mr. Oliver, and we are very grateful to them. The boys were keen and did extremely well.

There is to be a Federation of Y.F. Clubs in West Suffolk, and we shall be represented on the Committee. This Federation will then arrange similar competitions and events to those arranged this year by Mrs. Porter, the County Organiser.

Memoriam.

Mr. E. T. ENGLAND.

Mr. E. T. England, headmaster of King Edward's School, Birmingham, 1929-41, died at Exmouth on May 2.

Edwin Thirwall England, son of the late Edwin Bordieu England, Litt.D., was educated at Manchester Grammar School and at Trinity College, Cambrige, where he was a major scholar. He took a first class in the Classical Tripos Parr I. and a second class in Part II. (Philosophy). Becoming a schoolmaster he taught at Marlborough from 1901 to 1908, when he was appointed headmaster of King Edward VI. School, Bury St. Edmunds, where he remained until he went to Exeter School in 1912 in a similar post. Then he served for two years, 1927-29, as headmaster at Owen's School, before taking up the headmastership of King Edward's School, Birmingham. He married Mary Elizabeth, daughter of Stephen Marshall, of Skelwith Fold, Ambleside, and had two sons and four daughters.
