CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- G. MARSHALL (capt.) Has carried out his duties as captain most efficiently. He is probably the best player of the side and can always be relied on to work hard all the time.
- M. O. R. Minns (vice captain and right-wing). He unluckly missed several matches and only played regularly later in the season and so was not able to prove his worth. Gets the control of the control of the wing very well but must hit it across the ball. Stick work is good and be can usually beat his opponent. Tries hard and works in with his inside
- ⁴B. R. RUSH (centre-forward). A most forceful and energetic player who greatly improved the forward line. Stick work is excellent and he uses the flick to great advantage. Leads his line well and is a most dangerous forward. At times hangs on to the ball far too long but makes up for it by tremendous enthusiasm and hard work.
- †T. W. BLUMFIELD (right-half). The best defensive and attacking half in the team. His excellent eye and good stick work enable him to swing defence into attack. Backs up his wing well and passes accurately. Flicking is good and opens up the game with long upfield passes. An untring and sporting player who can always be relied upon to give of his very best.
- *R. G. WATSON (left-back). Hits hard but inaccurately and often passes to an opponent. Uses his speed well to clear dangerous situations, and tackles strongly. At times brilliant but has his off days when his mistakes are often fatal.
- *R. L. Dodde (left-wing). Has filled a most difficult position well and has been a great asset to the forward line. Stick work is good but must hit the ball harder. Picks up the ball on the run well and uses his speed to advantage. Flicks well but is a poor shot even with an open goal.
- B. J. BARRATT (inside-left). Lack of enthusiasm at the beginning of the season lost him his colours. Stick work is good, especially his "over the shoulder" flick. Feeds his wing well and the left wing work led to many goals. Should use his speed to give added thrust to his play.

- C. R. Rush. (right-back). A hard-hitting player who is very reliable as long as he does not try and hit first time. Would find a strong flick useful. Although slow can beat most wings by good stick work. A consistent but dangerous player.
- E. J. WATSHAM (goal-keeper). A very inconsistent player, but did much better at the end of the season. Should use his physical advantages and not wait for his opponents to shoot at him. Kicks well but should develop a stronger hit.
- D. W. MARRIOTT (inside-right). Although very small finds it no disadvantage. Has a good eye and hits strongly. Flicks well but is at times slow. Should swing the ball about more to save being tackled violently by a larger opponent. Will make a very good forward.
- G. E. WILLIAMS (left-half). Has a good eye and stops and hits well although at times far too hard. Rather ponderous and lumbering but a most effective half both in attack and in defence. Very willing and keen.

- D. G. SMITH (right-back). Showed great promise at the beginning of the season but his enthusiasm petered out. Quite a good hit but must learn to flick and use reverse sticks and will then make a good back.
- R. B. Abbott (right-wing). Although he only played once, showed great promise and should become a good wing. But he must develop a much stronger hit.

HOCKEY REVIEW.

Although the team only won one game during the season it must be remembered that our opponents were in many cases superior teams with a much larger choice of players. At the middle of the season the morale of the team dropped and ineffective play resulted, due to a run of losses. But after an excellent game against the hitherto unbeaten Northgate School the team spirit revived and play greatly improved.

At the beginning of the season positions were unsettled but after a few games the team settled down and produced some very good play. The approach work of the forward line was good, and the wings were used to great advantage to get the ball down the field. But often their passes never reached the three inside forwards or else these players did not finish strongly enough. Some arrangement should have been made about the taking of corners.

The defence was at times excellent but had its off days. The covering of the backs and halves was at times bad and often two or three opponents left unmarked on the back of the circle. All the defence men should develop a strong flick as the easiest and most effective method of clearing the ball. However, their general play was good with T. W. Blumfield outstanding as right-half.

The second XI., like the 1st, won only one game but produced some good play. Several players showed great promise and two or three discoveries were made.

The under 14 hockey team lost on both occasions but due to lack of practice as a team. The under 13 football team played very well to win both their games, the second by a clear margin.

Thanks are due to those who marked the pitches, and to P. Cooke who provided us with a supply of white balls, also to P. Game for his enthusiasm in reporting the games; he has now realised that shorthand would be an asset.
