MATCHES.

H.M.S. GANGES v. BURY SCHOOL.

The School gave a promising display, but showed many obvious weaknesses. In the first half Dodds was given little support, and against the run of the play Ganges scored the only goal. In the second half the School defence was very unsteady and Ganges went further ahead. Two minutes from time Dodds scored for the School.

CULFORD SCHOOL v. BURY SCHOOL.

. Culford took an early lead, but the School set up a series of strong attacks and Dodds equalised.

The second half brought thrill after thrill. Dodds gave the School the lead with a neat flick wide of the goal-keeper, but towards the end Culford drew level with a somewhat lucky goal.

IPSWICH NORTHGATE v. BURY SCHOOL.

Northgate soon showed themselves to be by far the better team and repeatedly found gaps in the School defence. The Ipswich side scored six times to Dodds' once for the School, and only brilliant goal-keeping by Macdonald prevented the score from being greater.

CAIUS COLLEGE II. v. BURY SCHOOL.

The School gave the College side a very good game and were unlucky to lose. Dodds and Barratt scored for the School and only towards the end did Caius bring the score from 2-2 to 4-2.

FRAMLINGHAM COLLEGE v. BURY SCHOOL.

With better luck the School would have won easily, instead of drawing two all. The School's goals were scored by Dodds. Towards the end the Framlingham backs managed to stop shots from Dodds, Barratt and Abbott when the goal-keeper was beaten.

BURY SCHOOL v. H.M.S. GANGES.

The School team was on top in the first half and led by three goals to one at half-time, Dodds scoring two and Barratt one. Dodds added another two in the second half and the School were easy victors by five goals to two.

BURY SCHOOL v. SUFFOLK COUNTY "A."

The Suffolk County Reserve team completely outclassed the School XI. to score fourteen goals against one scored by Dodds.

BURY SCHOOL v. BURY Y.M.C.A. II.

This proved to be the one game of the season in which the School failed to score and the Y.M.C.A. team proved worthy victors by two clear goals.

BURY SCHOOL v. NORTHGATE OLD BOYS.

The School attacked almost continuously, yet could only lead by one goal (Dodds) in the first half. Three more goals by Dodds in the second half, against one by the visitors, enabled the School to run out worthy winners.

BURY SCHOOL v. P. R. BOUGHTON'S OLD BOYS' XI.

A defensive blunder by the School enabled Abbott to score for the Old Boys, but after a brilliant run by Hunnable, Dodds made the scores level. Turvey gave the Old Boys the lead and later Brighton added a third.

HOCKEY REVIEW.

Although we commenced the term with seven of last year's team, much new talent had to be found for all elevens. The 1st XI. soon settled down to play good constructive hockey but luck was against them throughout the season. Although we have only won two matches, most games have been evenly contested.

The second XI. have had one of the most disastrous seasons for a long time. Seddon, ably backed by P. Shelbourne and Wharton, could not stem the flow of lost games. Their lack of success was due to far too much individual play and inferior marking.

The Junior XI. have lost both their matches but have revealed several promising players for the future.

Our soccer under 13 eleven have passed through the season unbeaten.

We are indebted to Mr. Butcher for a full and enjoyable fixture list. We thank P. G. Game for reporting on all our matches and to P. Shelbourne for a plentiful supply of hockey balls throughout the season. Lastly we thank E. J. D. Cory-Wright for his enthusiasm for his school eleven. He travelled with the team to see matches and kept records for the whole season.

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- *R. L. Dodds (captain, centre-forward). A popular captain who has led his side well; he struck top form early in the season and maintained it throughout. Leading goalscorer and undoubtedly the best player in the team.
- *B. J. BARRATT (vice-captain, inside-left). A tireless player who uses his excellent stickwork to great advantage. He has been responsible for a constant stream of well-directed passes. He never neglected his duties in defence and has repeatedly broken up attacks and set his forwards going. His shooting and stopping has been of the highest order.
- †G. E. C. WILLIAMS (centre-half). Uses his weight to make his tackles still more ferocious. Has filled his position well, and controlled the defence in all crises. His hitting

- has been very hard and clean. He has been cultivating a passable flick. Has been apt to tire towards the end of some games.
- [†]J. E. Hunnable (right-wing). Has at last learnt to hit hard when back circling. He is very fast, beating his opponents by gentle flicks and sprints. Should not hesitate to shoot. Centreing, dribbling, and tackling back excellent. A very enthusiastic player.
- †J. P. MACDONALD (goal-keeper). Has only taken up Hockey this term. Has shown enthusiasm in his position, and is fearless. Very ruthless in the circle. Has made many brilliant saves but should improve his kicking and running out. Should not give away "sticks."
- D. W. MARRIOTT (inside-right). Is handicapped by his size. Shooting and passing have fallen short of last year's standard. Should remember that quickness in the circle is essential. Rather slow on the ball. Has combined well with his winger. Tires quickly.
- D. G. SMITH (right-back). Has improved from last year, though still very slow in recovery. Should infuse more tenacity in tackling. Clears and flicks well. Inclined to dribble too much. Has not developed an understanding with his other back.
- I. F. McGeehan (right-half). A very tenacious player. Wields his stick very awkwardly, and passes weakly. Stopping has improved since last year. Gives excellent attacking support to his forwards.
- E. J. KNIGHT (left-half). Has his off days rather inconveniently. His stopping has been excellent. Is very good in midfield play. Supports his forwards well. Fails to cover up quickly when beaten.
- D. M. KIDD (left-back). Like Smith he is very slow in turning when beaten. Inobtrusively solid, but should not pass across the goal-mouth. Hitting rather weak.
- P. ABBOTT (left-wing). Has filled this difficult position well. Very fast and unorthodox in his approach work. Is rather frightened to shoot if given the opportunity. Never loses heart. Centres well but lacks hitting power. Switches positions with the centre-forward quickly.

- R. B. Abbott. Lacks enthusiasm. He keeps the ball too long and is very slow.
- A. G. Lee. Inclined to give "sticks" too often. He is very slow on the ball. May be very useful next season.
- R. H. Seddon. A very young player who has been hindered by lack of speed. Should keep up with his forwards. Finds the left wing a difficult position. Has captained the second XI, well from the centre-half position.
