



# Avon and Severn Crnise, Easter, 1949

We all arrived in a somewhat flustered condition on Saturday afternoon at Tewkesbury on the River Avon, where the attractive scenery is enhanced by Bredon Hill. We moved off when everything was unpacked and we covered the distance to Twyning "Fleet" very quickly but did not stop until some time later when we moored on the left bank of the river.

Sunday passed without mishap and everyone gradually got over the novelty of the "ship." Two locks were negotiated with some difficulty and the aid of another harassed boat crew. We found a pleasant mooring after some tricky steering had been accomplished round the Swan's Neck. Late that afternoon we reached Pershore and moored about half-a-mile below the pleasant little town. We started early on Monday morning and reached Tewkesbury at about mid-day. There we filled the tanks with water, had lunch, and went on to the River Severn after struggling with the rickety Tewkesbury lock. The scenery on the River Severn was an improvement on that of the Avon but good moorings were few and far between, the first we chose proving disastrous. After tea, when the mooring rope was being returned to the deck it fell into the water and became entwined with the revolving propeller shaft. The engine had to be turned off to save further entanglement of the rope and we were only saved from drifting broadside downstream by the timely intervention of another friendly boat, the crew of which towed us safely into the bank.

Early next morning, two of the boys went into the nearby village of Ripple and telephoned to the Boat Company at Tewkesbury for help. When the propeller had been freed by the company's engineer we continued on our way to Worcester where many of the boys spent the evening at the Gaumont Cinema.

On Wednesday the town was explored and there ensued no little foot-slogging in search of souvenirs, the Cathedral being the main attraction. Early in the afternoon we started out again and reached Stourport early in the evening. Only one or two of the boys were interested enough to explore the little industrial town.


We started early on Thursday morning and passed through the efficient locks in time to reach Tewkesbury at about 5 p.m. The evening was pleasantly spent in rowing and sailing on a beautiful stretch of river just outside the town.

On Friday we started out with the intention of getting to Gloucester and back in the day so that some of us could catch the early train next morning for Paddington. The river is rather narrow most of the way as it divides and joins up again beyond Gloucester but we covered the distance in such good time that we were able to spend two hours exploring the busy city. We quickly made the return journey to Tewkesbury and went a short way up the River Avon to moor for the last evening of a most enjoyable week.



JULY 7th, 1949.

During the course of the service, the Very Rev. J. L. White (Provost of St. Edmundsbury), dedicated the War Memorial. The President of the O.B.A., E. F. R. Stearn, addressed the Provost as follows:

"On behalf of the past and present members of the School, I ask you, Very Rev. Sir, to dedicate this Memorial which we have placed in the Cathedral Church to the memory of our friends who gave their lives in the Second World War." The Head Boy, having removed the Union Jack, the dedication took place, and suitable prayers were said, after which the Headmaster bid all to make an Act of Remembrance: "As we stand before the Memorials to the members of the School who fell in the two World Wars and in previous campaigns, let us in silence remember them all and entrust them to the keeping of God." There followed a silence and then the words:

# C.C.J. Motes.

The Summer Term is always a busy one for the C.C.F., and this term, in addition to the Annual Inspection, two Field Days and preparations for Camp, an extra Certificate "A" Board was held in the last week and a Signals Classification Exam. took place at the end of June.

The Contingent was inspected on June 21st by Major-General G. P. B. Roberts, C.B., D.S.O., M.C., Director Royal

Armoured Corps. In addition to the usual ceremonial and routine training classes, Post Certificate "A" N.C.O.'s and Cadets gave a demonstration of the Section in Attack. Perhaps the most effective part of the afternoon's work was the March Past, which particularly pleased the Inspecting Officer as it was performed on grass without even a drum to help with the step. A pleasant feature of Inspections in recent years is the absence of the severe formality of former days; once the ceremonial was completed, a natural and friendly atmosphere marked the remainder of the proceedings. General Roberts showed a desire to help rather than to criticise, though little escaped his keen observation.

The first Field Exercise was held on May 28th at Barton Mills under the direction of Major Marsh, 2 i/e 4th Battalion The Suffolk Regiment. This was a Patrol Exercise, and the fact that not a single shot was fired, although blanks were issued, emphasised the importance of stealthy movement and observation in modern warfare. The second Field Day consisted of a Map Exercise in the morning, followed by a "Section in Attack and Defence" Exercise in the afternoon. Unfortunately the restraint and control shown in the earlier Field Day was absent; ammunition was used with the utmost prodigality but little effect in the earlier stages, with the result that it was almost exhausted before the final stage, which consequently seemed to fizzle out.

As usual in the Summer Term, most of the firing on the Range was concentrated in the last few weeks. A team of four fired a series of matches against local clubs in the Suffolk County Rifle Association Summer League; but this is carried on until the middle of September, so the results are not yet available. Twenty-five Cadets became First Class Shots during the year, and one secured the Class A Junior Marksman's Badge of the National Small Bore Rifle Association—a much more severe test than the Empire Test.

A special Certificate "A" Board was held at Gibraltar Barracks on July 20th and all five candidates passed. At the end of the Summer Term there were 18 Cadets with Certificate "A" Part 2 and 15 with Part 1 out of the 51 Cadets in the Contingent. In addition, two members of the Post Certificate Signalling Class became classified signallers.

An enjoyable week's camp was held at Roman Way, Colchester, from July 23rd to July 30th; at the peak period there were about two thousand Cadets in Camp, under the command of Lt.-Col. A. W. A. Smith, D.S.O., who was in charge of the East Wretham Camp last year. The weather was perfect, the food was good, and each Contingent was able to plan and carry out its own training, helped by expert instructors when required. We were fortunate in having two P.S.I,'s with us, complete with transport, most of the time. Two N.C.O.'s attended the Instructors' Course, which should help them considerably when they are called upon to take classes during the coming year.

Although, like the large Contingents, we are not able to employ a full-time Sgt.-Instructor, we have recently engaged Sgt. Moore on a part-time basis, and he has done good service both in instructing Weapon Training and Drill and in looking after uniform, equipment and Small Arms, lightening a great deal the work of the Cadet C.Q.M.S.
