CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

*A. R. Thomson (captain and centre-half). No keener or more enthusiastic footballer ever walked on to the playing field. He is tireless, and sets an excellent example to his team mates. A strong kick and a determined tackler. His passes to the forwards might be less powerful and more accurately placed. As a centre-half he would find it useful to practise heading more. A very good captain.

*A. B. ROOD (vice-captain and left-half) A versatile player who can be relied upon to give a good performance in any position, especially in goal, though he has played elsewhere in most of the matches.

- †J. F. FORDHAM (right-half). Has the best ball control in the team, and also a very accurate long-range shot, but has a disappointing tendency to "hang-back" when opposed to players bigger than himself.
- †A. T. RUDDOCK (left-wing). A player with speed and footwork which could be developed to advantage. Should centre the ball more often, and not always shoot.
- †W. G. PODMORE (right-wing). His speed has developed surprisingly since last season, but unfortunately there has been little parallel improvement in ball-control. Centres well.

Mr. Elliott added that now the new Education Bill was passed it was a grave concern how the new buildings and the 100,000 additional teachers required were to be provided and how quickly. Without them the new Act was as dead as a doornail. Referring to the power given to local authorities to start boarding schools, Mr. Elliott said he did not want to see boarding schools started solely because of widely scattered populations or because there was something approaching domestic discord in an area. The real value of a boarding school was that it merged boys from different homes, from different parts of the country, of different types and interests, to the benefit of all. If the boarding school was going to have narrow limits it was going to lose an important part of its value.

FOOTBALL REVIEW.

As will be seen from the large number of first eleven characters this term, there has been difficulty in finding a stabilised team. Very few of last season's players remained, so we started off with a very inexperienced eleven. However, after a policy of trial and error, there has been evolved a team, the forwards of which realise that passing is a help after all, while the defence appreciates that first-time kicking is more important than sheer weight.

Despite the small percentage of wins the scores in the matches have been reasonably close, though the Thetford encounter showed that we have much to learn. However, the Junior eleven has kept up its record of winning every match.

The House matches were closely contested by the Tudors and Lancastrians, but the Royalists v. Foreigners, which resulted in a 4—0 win to the Royalists, was more or less a failure when its spirit was compared with the fierce rivalry of the old days. The Boarders showed a distinct lack of spirit and the Dayboys did little to make up for the deficiency.

Lastly, we thank Mr. Rich, our new Games Master, for all his efforts, especially for the comparatively full fixture list.

- †A. F. JENNINGS (goal-keeper). A keen young player, who has played some very good games. Lacks speed and timing to a certain extent. Should clear the ball sooner.
- †C. A. H. Hodge (right-back). An integral part of the defence, with a purely psychological effect. Is usually beaten by good footwork. His kicking has improved greatly.
- J. SYRETT (inside-right). A useful addition to the team. His passing and shooting are consistently good. Is rather easily intimidated.
- R. L. Dodds (inside-left). The youngest member and an enthusiast. Position-play and shooting excellent. Is not usually handicapped by his size.
- J. F. TRIPP (left-back). Has improved greatly with experience. Can kick well, but his timing must be improved still more.
- B. H. AUSTIN (centre-forward). Although he has had considerable success (three goals against Stowmarket in his first match), his size has prevented him from being a powerful spearhead. Must be faster on the ball and not so nervous.

Also played-

- P. F. Webb (left-back). Unfortunately he had an accident in one of the early matches and has not played since. Kicks well and would have been a strong link in the eleven.
- P. M. MILLER. Proved a great disappointment as a forward, despite his experience from last season's team, but has recently played well as a half. Must learn to use the other members of the eleven and not to hinder them.
- S. GALLOWAY. Always puts his heart into the game. Uses his head effectively, but is inclined to muddle.
