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Editorial.

A TERM that begins with Sports, goes on to Cricket, pauses for a holiday half-way through, develops two Inspections, culminates in Examinations and an Old Boys' Re-union, and passes gloriously away into the longest and most inviting of holidays, cannot fail to be exhilarating and memorable.

Such has been the Summer Term of 1932. A glance at its activities here may serve to whet the interest of our readers for the fuller account contained in succeeding pages.

The pace was set at the Sports. That it was a hot one may be judged by the result of the 220 yards which was run in record time by the School Champion.

The Cricket season has been a most enjoyable one and crowned with a pleasing measure of success. Thanks to the kindness of the Headmaster in providing a cricket coach and giving special facilities for nets, the 1st XI. have greatly benefitted, and the younger cricketers have also been able to have more practice at the game.

Another development for the furtherance of Games has been the formation of a Committee with full powers of organisation and executive.

The O.T.C., with the military precision habitual to it, earned another excellent report at the Annual Inspection.

With regard to School Work: Since it is now too late to take thought for the Exams. and too early to contemplate their results, we can only trust that the reports of the examiners may be as pleasing as the flawless composition which doubtless H.M.I. is now engaged in writing about his recent visit to the School.

It is pleasing to relate that the Frederick William King Scholarship, founded last year, has been fittingly awarded to the Head Boy, B. C. King. It will be remembered that he won an Open Major Scholarship at Durham University where he will go into residence next term. We trust he may continue to crown effort with success in his chosen Northern Capital of learning.

In conclusion, may we commend the following pages to our readers, and themselves to the joys of a well-earned holiday.

Sports Day.

Thursday, 5th May, was not exactly the day we would have chosen to have for our Sports had we known that Boreas was to flail us with his chilly gusts and Zephyrus with his gentler breeze. Cold and squally though it was the day was eminently successful and in fact the cold helped us to get through our programme in almost record time which was, no doubt, a boon to the many visitors who were pleased to honour us with their presence, and who must have anticipated better weather for such an occasion.

Several events had been decided before the day, the most notable of which was the School Mile which developed into two distinct divisions early in the race, both finishing in fine style. King ii. led for the greater part of the race but was passed by Calton early in the last lap; but he was not beaten, he still kept close up and in the last twenty yards was able to draw alongside and finally win by an inch or two; truly a splendid finish and worthy of the cup so kindly given by B. J. Mitchell, Esq.

This year the Cross-Country race was run over a new course, one more true to the name of the race and incidentally freer from the possibility of accidents on the Highway. It was won by Calton who was closely attended by Boys i. and King ii., a cup was kindly presented by the Old Boys for this event.

The actual events of the day were not noticeable for any great turns of speed owing to the moist condition of the surface which had been affected by several showers earlier in the day; yet the running was even and the races well contested. The best performance was that of the Victor Ludorum, Tulloch, who won the School 220 yards easily and broke a School record which has stood since A. S. Waugh created it in 1924; the new time for the race being 25 1/5th seconds.

There were the usual crowds taking part in the Half-Mile Handicap and the Sack Race. In the former Morley threaded his way through half a hundred runners to win a good race; in the latter, although all praise is due to the Sparke brothers who were first and second, yet the valiant efforts to get up, which one boy made and continued well into the next race, are worthy of special mention.

This year the Age and Mile Relay Races were re-introduced, but as Royalist and Foreigner competitions, not as

House races. Both were watched with great interest. The Foreigners won the former and the Royalists the latter.

The finale was, as usual, the Tug-of-War, and upon it hung the fate of the Challenge Cup, for although the Foreigners were leading by quite a substantial margin yet the Royalists were still able to take the Cup if they pulled well. The ground was more favourable to those pulling from the South and since the Foreigners pulled from that end first they were able to win although there had to be three pulls before a decision was reached.

The weather being what it was the prizes were distributed in the Gymnasium, Mrs. Orpen having kindly consented to do the honours of the occasion. Amongst the many cups was the "Crack" Challenge Cup, for the School Quarter Mile, which has recently been presented to the School by the retiring secretary of the Old Boys' Association. This year we had an innovation in the form of silver medals for the winners and bronze medals for the seconds.

After the Prize-giving the visitors were the guests of Col. and Mrs. Wadmore and with their departure from the dining hall, a most enjoyable day was brought to a close.

BURY SCHOOL v. THE OLD BOYS.

This interesting fixture was played in perfect conditions on March 19th. The Old Boys brought up a strong team, although they were without their international, John Ashton, who, it had been hoped, would lead the side.

From the starting whistle the School made a dash for goal, but the O.B.'s were not to be caught off their guard and soon they forced play to the opposite end and Burdon getting a shot in which the goal-keeper stopped but could not clear, Gould netted. To this the School replied after some minutes play round the Old Boys' goal, Mitchell scoring from a well-judged pass from Tulloch. The next effective thrust was made by the Old Boys, the goal-keeper coming out to meet it, came to the ground and Waugh i. scored comfortably. Alston and Turner (D. E.) at half, who played a good game throughout, were now seen to advantage and set their forwards going again and again but the School defence was solid and broke up the attacks. The School forwards now showed initiative and a pass from the right wing enabled Boys i. to score, his shot hitting an upright and giving Secker, the O.B.'s goal-keeper who was playing a great game, no chance. Amongst many attempts, Alston made a brilliant break-away carrying the ball on his stick, but all efforts to score failed and at half-time the score was 2 all.

On re-commencing the Old Boys scored almost immediately through Waugh (A. S.) and for some time had most of the play which was very fast. After a dead time the School took up the running and the forwards led by Tulloch and Mitchell pressed incessantly. Mitchell was again sent in to score from an opening made by Tulloch, and soon after a hot shot by the same player being only partially cleared, Tulloch put the finishing touch to a well concerted motion. This put the "Present" one up on the "Past." Despite strenuous efforts on both sides no further score resulted, the School thus won a homeric contest by 4 goals to 3. Teams:

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

- *†P. W. K. MITCHELL (Captain). We must all congratulate him on his very efficient captaincy and the help and interest he has put into the 1st XI. Cricket this season. He has had very little luck as a batsman but has bowled well and is an excellent fielder.
- *J. S. BOYS I. His consistently good batting and bowling throughout the season has on many occasions saved the School from defeat. As a batsman and bowler he shows style and promise. With his natural physical development and increased experience he should prove himself an excellent all round cricketer. A good fielder but suffers from lazy spasms.
- *J. F. W. CALTON. A patient batsman who has played several invaluable innings largely due to his complete indifference to either the wicket or the bowling. He is inclined to poke instead of cutting or driving the ball, a fault peculiar to many left-handed batsmen. He must cultivate a scoring stroke other than a hit to leg and avoid playing across a good length ball. A fair fielder, but slow off the mark.
- *G. M. CHRYSAL. He shapes well as a batsman and only needs a little more confidence to prove his ability. He has played good cricket throughout the season and has definitely some style. He must punish loose balls more severely; with more experience he should prove a very useful batsman. A good fielder and a very fair change bowler.
- *F. W. ORTTEWELL. As a batsman he shows promise and has played several good innings during the season. His batting is handicapped by rather slow footwork, this fault will be overcome by constant practice. A very fair change bowler and a very safe field.
- †A. J. TULLOCH. He must learn to be patient and use his hitting ability to the best advantage by waiting for a suitable ball. If he could do this he would cultivate a powerful "off" drive and be an asset to a team as a quick scorer. A very fair bowler but rather spasmodic, a good, safe fielder.

- †H. S. SAUNDERS. His batting is hampered by his inability to make up his mind to either play well forward or back to a good ball. A keen fielder.
- †E. SCARLATO. He has kept wicket with some success during the season although somewhat spasmodically. He must try eventually to stand well up to the wicket. As a batsman he has not had much success but appears to have developed into a hitter.
- A. M. LLOYD. As a batsman he lacks style of any description and must cultivate some orthodox footwork. A fair fielder.
- J. A. RUDD. He must learn to play with a straight bat and concentrate on his driving strokes instead of playing across. A very spasmodic fielder.
- E. B. MORLEY. He has very poor footwork and must learn to play with a straight bat. Poor in the field.

- W. J. L. GARDINER I. Very slow to make up his mind. He plays with a straight bat but must concentrate more on his cricket to gain any success.
- D. E. JAMBLIN. A very fair change bowler but has not enough confidence in himself to have any success as a batsman. This fault will be overcome by experience.
- G. H. LONG. He has some good scoring strokes and punishes loose balls. Taking everything into consideration he is a good fielder at point. C.M.

*EVANS. A promising bowler. In batting he is too impatient to get runs. Inclined to be rather supine in the field.

†LONG. Generally bats with confidence and fields as well as can be expected.

†BOYS II. Can bowl a good ball and his batting is improving though he must learn to deal with a leg ball.

†WATKINS. Developing into quite a sound batsman, his fielding is generally smart.

†HALLIWELL. Were he to play in matches as well as he does in nets he would do well. In matches both batting and bowling are erratic.

†GARDNER. Can bowl a length ball. His batting is not aggressive enough and in fielding he needs to be more alert and prepared.

†LEIGH I. Can bat quite well but he is inclined to be lethargic and unenterprising. As a wicket-keeper he has much to learn, at times he has shaped well.

PUGHE. He too frequently throws his wicket away by his tendency to use 'agricultural' strokes. Is developing as a bowler.

The Sports were well contested. Orbell was Junior Champion. A noble challenge cup was most generously presented by Mr. Crack, who for many years has been the Secretary of the Old Boys' Association. It has been allocated to the Quarter Mile. Also cups as prizes were kindly given by B. J. Mitchell, Esq., and the Old Boys' Association, these were assigned to the Mile and the Cross Country, respectively. Otherwise prizes took the form of medals, silver for the firsts, and bronze for seconds. Mr. Mitchell has also most kindly presented a Challenge Cup for swimming.

After the first fortnight of term Cricket has been intensively pursued. The first XI. have been fortunate in

having a coach to train them, and daily nets. For these assistances our heartiest thanks are due to the Headmaster; considerable improvement in play has resulted.

The batting has been brighter, but still lacks in confidence, and power to get runs on a hard wicket. The bowling has been good but is nearly all of the fast-medium type and has been inclined to become mechanical or erratic. Players should endeavour to vary their pace and pitch more and keep steadfastly to the stumps.

The fielding has been irregular; at times good, but several matches have been lost by players failing to hold catches.

The Second XI., a small but great-hearted team, have played keenly and well, and have received every support and encouragement from Mr. Barker. May they long remember their first joyous season of match cricket and profit by its lessons to the extent of making a spirited and winning 1st XI. next year. Let them remember:—NOW is the time to get the footwork right for that off-drive or awkward leg stump ball. NOW is the time to get that perfect control of length and direction without which no bowler can hope to be successful. To-day, this year, is the date to begin training if you mean to be a member of next season's historic record-winning XI.

Swimming has been very popular and most boys have bobbed up from the submarine class. We understand that a trial of the Dreadnoughts in the form of a relay race, with the "Mitchell" Cup as trophy, is to be staged this season.

One needs to be in training to contemplate the football season when the thermometer stands at 100. I trust it is no heat engendered mirage but a true vision that I see of a small but skilful team, willing, and winning success.

WEAPON TRAINING.—The weapon training results indicate a good standard. Aiming instruction of a squad was well carried out.

MANGUUVRE.—The platoon carried out an attack under artificial conditions imposed by the limitations of ground.

Orders were clearly given and sections manœuvred as well as the conditions allowed. The support of movement by fire was well understood and the scheme was carried out with plenty of vigour.
