## Editorial.

"He that believeth shall not make haste."

OOD as this advice is for all times, it is particularly appropriate to present circumstances. Just because we believe we have been obliged to take up arms to defend Christian civilisation against a cruel and Godless enemy, so it is essential we should not allow ourselves to become impatient—with the seeming slow progress of event, with war-time inconveniences and, above all, with our allotted tasks. However un-heroic, however unimportant, however humdrum they may seem, they are our very own while they last, and the more conscientiously we perform them, the better shall we prepare ourselves for any greater ones the future may bring.

Nor need we look far to see the value of this preparation. Already scores of our school fellows are serving with the Forces. As they tell us of their experiences, and we glimpse their cheerfulness, their resolution and their loyalty to he organisations they now belong to, we remember that yesterday they too were boys of this School, and we dare to hope that outlook on life and its tasks held up to them while they were here has helped to shape them into the fine men they are proving. They know they can count on the most earnest wishes of all here for their success and for their safety.

Hence when we record that this, our first war-time term, has so far been much as other terms, we thereby indicate that the great lessons of patience and perseverance are being practiced worthly. Even if our first reassembly was a little tense, and school routine, to begin with, a little irksome, it was not long before we found ourselves settled, as of old, into the daily round and common task of School life, which furnishes ammle omogrunities for the cultivation of settling character.

Unavoidably, for lack of transport and similar reasons, most of our School matches have had to be abandoned. To make up, several new fixtures were found, and there have been good games on almost every fine half-holiday—these have been

all too few, as the season has been a wet one. We trust our readers will understand, that owing to scarcity and cost of paper, the games reports that follow are necessarily brief, and indeed the present number of the magazine unavoidably reduced in size.

Speech Day, likewise, had to be postponed. This is the more to be regretted as our examination candidates of last Summer have a good record of success. Not only did nine gain their School Certificates, more than half of them with London Matriculation exemption, but also both our London University Intermediate candidates passed, and passed well. To the best of our belief this is the first time in the history of the School that such a double success has been gained, and Brassel and Todd are very much to be congratulated. We are all the more pleased to be able to record that, on the strength of his success, and in view of his entrance into the University of London, Brassel has been awarded a School Leaving Exhibition.

The Scouts, also, may justly be proud of the success of their camp. For the first few days the weather was far from favourable, but in spite of storms, all kept dry and well, and all enjoyed the experience of a well-run and happy camp. Mr. White's presence was an invaluable as it was welcome, and the French and Czech Scouts, present as guests, proved the best of good companions.

Turning to the future, we should like to draw our readers attention to the School Calendar, which will be found within, and to add a word of comment. The exceptionally early date of Easter in 1940 is the reason why the present term must end somewhat earlier than usual, so that a Christmas holiday of four weeks and an Easter term not shorter than ten weeks may be secured. Unavoidably, the Easter holidays must also come early in the year, and the Summer term be a long one. Some day, it is to be hoped, the date of Easter may be stabilised; until this is so, there is no way of obviating calendars such as next year?

As may be imagined, we are doubtful of the present addresses of a good many of our Old Boy subscribers. Should any Old Burian not receive his copy of this issue, may we hope he will ask himself if he has notified us of his present address, and also if his subscription is paid to date. If he will then write to us appropriately we shall be happy to rectify any omission. In conclusion, as the customary good wishes for Christmas rea hardly appropriate under the present unhappy circumstances, may we be allowed to substitute the earnest hope that, ere long, peace and good will may be restored to a suffering world, and that a new and better order may emerge from the dust of condition.

# 1ST ELEVEN CHARACTERS.

\*P. R. R. BOUGHTON (centre-forward; captain). A natural footballer. Possesses good ball control and distributes the ball equally well with head or foot. Shoots strongly and accurately. These qualities, coupled with his enthusiasm for and knowledge of the game, have made a respected and successful leader.

- \*K. R. Kiddy (left-back; vice-captain). Kicks extremely well first time, with both feet. Heads strongly and uses good anticipation in intercepting.
- †F. B. EVENS (centre-half). Has played as a 3rd back extremely well; kicks strongly with both feet. In heading he judges the flight of the ball badly.
- \*R. J. Bugg (left-wing). Although not a fast runner he uses his fine ball control to make up for this deficiency. Has a powerful shot and centres cleverly.
- \*J. E. WOMBWELL (right-back). His strong first-time kicking soon changes defence to attack. He tackles pluckily but might recover more quickly.
- P. R. BAXTER (right-wing). Although quite small he is very fast but only really effective when the ball is in front of him. Ball control fair, but often shoots when he ought to centre.
- †M. B. RUMSEY (inside-right). When he has the ball under control, his dribbling is excellent, but he often has difficulty in trapping. Passes well, but shoots poorly.
- D. R. PARKYN (left-half). Has little ball control, tackles strongly, and heads well. He backs up the attack to a fault and is very slow in recovering. In throwing in he has not tried to throw far enough.
- A. W. Neil (right-half). Tackles and kicks strongly, but recovers slowly. Ball control not good but passes well.
- M. W. Nell (inside-left). Still very young and shows great promise. Ball control good, but sometimes keeps the ball too long.
- J. C. Browne (goal-keeper). He catches the ball very well and is very plucky in running out. When hard pressed he has a bad habit of throwing the ball out up the centre and not to the wing. Should find more length and not height in his kicking.
