## *Editorial.*

“WORK when you work and play when you play,” might well be the motto of the Summer Term (and Holiday) which present more opportunities for endeavour, and offer more varieties of work and play than any other season. Wise in his generation is he who has taken advantage this year, in the golden days of his youth, of these glorious opportunities.

Although the continued hot weather has proved rather trying to continuous application, a spur to effort has been provided in the news of the successes at Cambridge of two well remembered Old Boys, R. G. Evans and G. S. Gough, who have added lustre to their names and honour to the School by further distinguishing themselves both on the field of fame and in the realms of knowledge.

One of the most noticeable happenings of the term has been the increase in numbers. The 100 has not merely been reached but exceeded by 10; and, although the end of the School year is the favourite leaving time, there is every prospect of the numbers continuing to increase.

Camp and the holidays remain to round off the summer. We wish those who are leaving us every success in their new enterprises, and those who remain such relaxation as may cause them to return with renewed vigour to maintain the ancient traditions and increase the present prestige of Bury School.

## Speech Day.

The following account is taken from the Local Press.

Speech Day at King Edward VI. School, on Tuesday, March 15th, was a day of review, of reminiscence, of anticipation and hope for the future.

Dr. Gray presided, and was supported by the Mayor (Ald. J. Ridley Hooper), the Head Master (Mr. B. S. Richards, M.A.), Dr. J. S. Hinnell, the Rev. Canon F. J. Fulford, Mr. A. Oliver Lusher, and Mr. Donald Hunter.

Among the visitors were many prominent residents of the town and district. During the presentation of the prizes the scholars manifested traditional enthusiasm.

Dr. Gray explained the enforced absence of several persons prominently identified with the School, including Lord Bristol, Sir John Wood, Canon Hill and Canon Wilson. They had also to deplore the loss of Bishop Harrison, "the little Bishop," as he had been sometimes called, also the great loss of the Chief Shepherd of the Diocese.

Dr. Gray went on to say that for the first time that ancient School, so full of hallowed memories and memories of great men, was now under the aegis of the Government. They had therefore to welcome new members to the governing body, accessions of strength which he was quite sure they would in the future learn to appreciate. Mr. H. A. L. Fisher, in his Magna Charta, had had many problems to face, and one of the problems most difficult to solve had been the problem of how best to get the old and great public schools into a system of national education. It was inevitable that this great School should come under the system of national education, and the advantages accruing thereby. He gave it as his opinion that "on the quality and the extent of education that we shall obtain in England for the next 25 years will depend the future welfare and the destiny of the Country and the Empire." Empire and education were surely convertible terms.

Having paid a tribute to all those who belonged to the great teaching profession, Dr. Gray called upon the Head Master for the Examiner's Report, which stated that the tone of the School was high, and the relations between staff and boys most cordial and healthy. The discipline generally was good and easily maintained. It was pleasant to note the increase in numbers during the past twelve months. A further

increase would be only a fitting reward for the whole-hearted devotion to the interests of the School of the Head Master, backed by his staff. The Examiner was the Rev. Walter New, M.A. (Cantab.), formerly scholar of Peterhouse, Cambridge, Rector of Stathern.

Mr. Richards explained that the report went back to the end of last July, their Speech Day having to be delayed. The boys were for the main part day boys, who would have to take their part in the civic life of the borough, and they hoped to turn them out really valuable citizens, with the hall-mark of good character and good tone. With reference to successes, Gerald Gough, who was known at the School as "Gough i.," had obtained a First Class in Mathematical Tripos, part I. He was now a mathematical scholar of Pembroke College, Cambridge. R. G. Evans obtained a Third Class in the same Tripos. He wished to congratulate Evans on being selected to play for Cambridge University last year at cricket. He got six of the M.C.C. wickets for 42 runs.

The Chairman had referred to losses. The late Bishop had always taken a great interest in the School, and had presented a divinity prize every year, and there was one that day. Bishop Harrison was a former master. A celebrated old boy, Major-Gen. Lee, had also passed away. He was a man who had taken the greatest possible interest in the School and everything connected with it. The Head Master referred to the welcome increase in numbers. Whilst at one time the School looked like fading away, with numbers down to 87, this term it was 98, and next term would be over 100.

The boys were very keen on games, which, he thought, taught them a sort of discipline. Unlike so many other schools, the boys were also keen on the O.T.C. Parents had, presumably, taken some notice of words he had spoken from that desk in years past. They were beginning to realise that they do not merely send their sons to school and then put the whole of the responsibility on to the shoulders of the masters or the head master. Speaking from his 27 years' experience as a Master, he found that boys were sportsmen. (Applause). In conclusion, he thanked the prefects, senior students, and the masters for their assistance. (Applause).

The Mayor, who presented the prizes, gave some interesting reminiscences connected with the Grammar School, and said that if there were one thing which must commend itself to the parents it was the excellent feeling which existed

between the Head Master and the boys. (Cheers). He would give to the boys a Latin motto to remember: "Saviviter in modo fortiter in re," which being translated meant "Kindliness and gentleness in manner, resolution and determination in action," or, to put it into two words, "courtesy and courage."

They were reminded of a certain royal occupant of the throne of England, who was supposed to have laid the foundation stone of that School. He thought that the members of the present royal family would go down to history beloved by all because of their innate courtesy to all classes of their subjects. That was a worthy example which the boys might well follow—exercising politeness towards their own sisters as well as to the other fellows' sisters. (Laughter). Whether they were in school or in the more difficult battlefield of life, they "should always keep their temper," lead a clean life, and use clean language. The boys should always play for their own side, not merely for their own hand, and always play the game, and they would then become courteous, courageous, patriotic English sportsmen and gentlemen. (Applause).

## The Sports.

The annual Athletic Sports of the King Edward VI. Grammar School, Bury St. Edmund's, were held on the School sports-field on Tuesday, May 3rd. The inauspicious weather was responsible for the rather sparse attendance, but in no way damped the enthusiasm of the scholars, and an excellent programme of events was well contested. The Challenge Cup (given by the Hon. Walter Guinness, M.P.) was won for the fifth consecutive year by the Royalists (Day Boys) who defeated the Foreigners (Boarders) by 1,400 points to 823 points. The School Champion Cup was secured by G. J. Hinnell (89 points). Owing to the slippery condition of the ground, consequent upon a heavy shower of rain immediately prior to the first event, the High Jump (under 15) was postponed, thus leaving the winning of the Under 15 Champion (Cadogan Cup) to be decided.

## PRIZE DISTRIBUTION.

The prizes were distributed by Miss Bullen at the close of the sports. In introducing her, the Head Master said they all regretted that her father, Mr. Chas. Bullen, an Old Boy, whose whole heart and interest were centred in the School,

was prevented, by reason of his ill-health and the unfavourable weather, from attending. He thanked the company for their encouragement, the prize donors, and those who had shown such interest in the School's athletics. Sports did, and ought to, form a prominent part in school life, without being overdone, and helped to bring out points which such things as Latin, etc., could not. He also thanked the judges, Canon Wilson and Mr. Claughton, who had undertaken the duties for some years, and the other officials and Committee, particularly Mr. Manley for all his assistance and organising work. (Applause). The School was about the most fortunate for a School of its size that he had known for the number of trophies they possessed. A handsome new cup from the Rev. A. L. Grimley in memory of his son Rupert (1/7th Gordon Highlanders) who lost his life in the War, for a shooting trophy, was received that morning. They already had the "Callis" Shooting Cup and so they would make a difference in the qualification for the cups.

After the presentation, Canon Wilson, in proposing a vote of thanks to Miss Bullen, remarked that the School had reached three figures (over a hundred boys) for the first time for over twenty years. To commemorate that distinction the School would be granted a whole holiday sometime during this term. (Loud applause).

Miss Bullen, in a well-expressed reply, said they sometimes forgot because of their close association with it that the School was a famous one. Very likely she had handed prizes that afternoon to boys who would bring fame and honour to their families and their old School. She felt that their kindness in giving her the honour of distributing the prizes was partly intended to mark their kind feelings towards her father who was very much attached to his old School. She wished that she could say that she too was an Old Boy. In conclusion Miss Bullen paid a tribute to the "plucky way in which the losers lost." It was more difficult to lose than to win and was very often the means of stimulating more "grit" in a boy than if he had won. (Applause).

Rousing cheers were given for Miss Bullen, the Judges and Staff, and then, on the call of Canon Wilson, the visitors gave three cheers for the boys, thus terminating another very enjoyable Sports Day.

## Bishop King's Wedding.

At St. Peter's Church, Eaton Square, London, on Tuesday, the Right Rev. Bishop George Lanchester King, D.D., of 87, Eccleston Square, S.W., was married to Miss Louisa Beatrice Bewley, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. William H. Bewley, of Dublin. The bridegroom is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. N. King, of Great Barton Place, Bury St. Edmund's, and is well-known in the district. He was for many years Bishop of Madagascar, and in the summer of 1919 returned home to undertake secretarial work for the S.P.G.

The service was conducted by the Right Rev. the Bishop of Kensington, assisted by the Rev. M. R. Bethune, vicar of Hindhead, the Rev. Canon A. E. King, vicar of Great Waldingfield (brother of the bridegroom), and the Rev. Austin Thompson, vicar of St. Peter's Eaton Square. The bride was given away by her brother, Mr. Edgar Bewley. Her two bridesmaids were Miss Constance Gedge and Miss Evelyn Gowers. The Rev. Charles Lanchester was best man. The signing of the register took place in the church itself, and not in the vestry, the books being arranged on a small table for this purpose, after which there was a full choral Celebration of the Holy Communion for the bride and bridegroom only.

## ROYALISTS v. FOREIGNERS.

This match was played with the usual enthusiasm on Monday, March 14th. It began at 3-45, the Foreigners' playing down. At the commencement Basagoiti made a good run and nearly scored, the Day Boys immediately took up the challenge and pressed hard, however, Steed gave relief, clearing when the ball was on the line between the goal posts. De Chateaux and Lipsett then made good but unsuccessful attempts for the Foreigners. After several pushes the Royalists were awarded a penalty corner, but Gooch saved finely, and twice later upset the attack by running out. The Boarders took heart again, gained a penalty corner, and in the mêlée Lipsett scored with a very easy shot.

Soon after Dowse equalised from a hard high shot. From the bully the Day Boys got away again and carried the ball up the field by the short-passing game and Dowse scored a second time.

Until half-time gave relief the Royalists steadily kept up the pressure, and Dowse, Conlan and Ashton each scored with terrific high shots. The Foreigners played hard and tried to break up the attack and get through by short sharp rushes, but without result. Thus at half-time the score was 5-1 in the Royalists' favour.

After the interval the Royalists attacked anew, and from a hard pass on the left wing from Dowse, Ashton tapped the ball into the net with a beautifully timed forward stroke.

From the bully Ashton got away and reached the circle, where he passed to Dowse who naturally returned the ball to the net in recognition of Ashton's previous good offices. Again from a right wing rush, which Hinnell had set in motion, Dowse scored.

The Foreigner backs, Steed and Stearn, played a very good game bearing the brunt of the attack, which was practically that of the first XI. They are to be congratulated on conceding so few goals in the second half when playing up the hill. Waugh i. at centre-half worked hard, but the Royalist forwards outpaced him. The forward line was too small to annoy the opposing backs greatly. Basagoiti on the wing made several good runs.

For the Royalists, Hinnell i. played a good game, feeding his forwards well and engineering many of the successful attacking motions. The forward line played brilliantly, Dowse Conlan and Ashton being particularly conspicuous. The backs and goal had very little to do.

The star performer of the match was Gooch, the Foreigners' goalkeeper, who was called upon incessantly to save and clear. He stopped every shot it was possible to, and some which seemed impossible. Teams:—

- \*R. C. GOOCH (goal). A new member of the team, who filled this somewhat difficult position very well. He clears hard, although at times inclined to be a little slow. He should practise running out to a man a little sooner. He played his best game v. the East Anglian School.
- §\*D. WAUGH (left-half). He has tried hard in this new position, being more useful than in goal. He stops the ball quite well, but must clear at once and not lose time.
- \*S. S. STRICKLAND (right-half). A small player, who tries hard and sticks to his man quite well. He stops the ball well, but must clear quicker and a good deal harder.
- \*L. DE CHATELEUX (outside-left). Tries hard, but should get rid of the ball quicker. Owing to his size he cannot make very much ground. His stick work is neat.

## SECOND ELEVEN CHARACTERS.

- \*L. C. DE CHATELEUX (Captain), (centre-half). Has shown considerable ability and resource as a leader. By his game example, against heavier and faster sides, he has kept the team trying. Feeds his forwards with judgment but must endeavour to get the ball to them a bit quicker and a little harder. Is sound in defence, making up with skill what he lacks in speed and reach.

- \*A. S. WAUGH (Vice-Captain), (inside-right). Has proved a useful vice-captain and one of the most successful forwards, but has scarcely settled down to his position yet. Must endeavour to make more ground and get to the ball first or tackle right in.
- \*J. E. STEARN (right-back). A reliable hard-working and hard-hitting player. He has overcome his tendency to stick. His eagerness still sometimes leads him too far away from his right position, and he must try to get back quicker.
- \*T. H. GOULD (inside-left). A stylish player who has a good eye. His stick work is neat but he needs to put his stick in quicker. He makes ground rapidly but should give up one-handed play and pass in rather than out. Must learn to tackle instead of hanging back when an opponent gets the ball.
- \*A. W. BEST (goal). Has played well throughout the season. He gets behind the hottest shots, rushes out well, and and clears quickly and strongly to the wing. He is apt to misjudge easy shots and might kick out more often. Must avoid sticking, and hitting the ball over the goal line when trying to clear.
- \*E. D. BOBY (right-half). A very dashing half whose energy sometimes outruns his discretion. He hits and plays tremendously hard, marks his man well, but is inclined to starve his wing. Sticks rather too freely and must learn to pass definitely to a man and use more judgment in throwing in.
- \*G. C. BACON (centre-forward). Has improved immensely, is a very bustling and promising player, but at present rather uncertain. Must try to get hold of the ball and make more ground in mid-field, and must endeavour to get to the half or back and rush the goal-keeper before they can get rid of the ball.
- \*C. J. HINNELL (outside-left). A very reliable player who has improved tremendously, all his work is clean cut and thorough. He keeps his place and stops the ball dead often by hand. Makes goals and centres hard; needs to practice getting the ball away quicker from the throw-in.

\*M. J. BIRMINGHAM (outside-right). Keeps well up and centres accurately and hard; is learning to make ground before passing, travels fast, is still rather prone to stick.

J. M. DIXON (left-half). Has a good eye and uses his hand to advantage in stopping the ball. He hits hard and with judgment; is getting to mark his man more closely, but is still far too slow in getting back and in hitting.

W. L. SHAW (left-back). Is a lively, energetic player, always on the move and much in the way. Must learn to hit the ball rather than push it, and to clear more quickly.

Also played—

D. B. MONTGOMERY (left-back). Has improved in style and become more reliable; is learning to clear harder. Must get closer to his man and not come too far forward, as he is slow in getting back.

B. S. LIPSETT. Has played at inside-right and left-half. Works hard but takes a long time to warm up. Is slow with his stick, and must pass definitely instead of hitting to the opposing backs.
