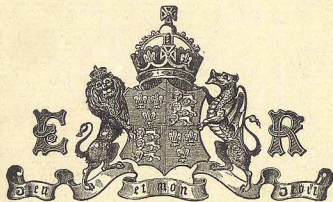

Editorial.

THE financial position of *The Burian*, from the revival of the magazine in 1895, has been unstable and unsatisfactory. When the magazine has not been actually in debt, it has—as will be seen from earlier editorials—been on the verge of bankruptcy.

Originally, the subscription covered the cost of production; now, although the magazine has been ruthlessly cut down in size, and the printing is done at the lowest figure, it does not.

As there is a very considerable debit balance it is felt that, if the magazine is to continue, a correspondingly considerable increase of subscription is necessary to put the magazine in a state of solvency, not to say financial security, and we believe that both the Old and the Present Boys of Bury will not grudge the amount necessary for the survival and maintenance of their School Magazine. It is therefore proposed to charge 2/- each number, as from December.

This term has been a busy one: our numbers have increased to 122 and a new Form has been inaugurated. Moreover, we have undergone our first official inspection by the Board of Education, the results of which are being awaited with mixed feelings. It is hardly to be hoped that such a progressive place as Bury School can be expected to please such a dignified and conservative body as a Government Department in every detail at the first attempt. Nevertheless we think that the interchange of ideas resulting from the new association may prove enlightening; and criticism, when constructive, is helpful.

Another new feature in work has been the introduction of a more competitive spirit in form by dividing the members into "Romans" and "Carthaginians," so that each individual is pitted—in brains and behaviour—against a worthy adversary. Although the system has only been in vogue this term it has produced excellent results and some boys have shown that they possess dormant abilities and capacity that previously no one would have accused them of possessing. The half-holiday, granted to the side which scores the most points in each form, has not diminished the keenness of the competition.

Although the football teams have not been very successful this season, there is a marked improvement in dash and doggedness noticeable, which augurs well for years to come. The teams owe many thanks to Mr. Tobin for his great help in advising and training them.

In conclusion we would take farewell of our readers with the age old but ever new wish of a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. We hope that those who return to School again in January may find—as they usually seem to—that the term is as pleasurable as the holidays.

Speech Day.

We are indebted to the "Bury Free Press" for the following account.

On Thursday, December 1st, a large company of parents of the boys and friends of the School assembled in the Big School.

The distribution of prizes was undertaken by the Lord Lieutenant of the County, Sir Courtenay Warner, Bart., C.B., M.P., and with him on the platform were Canon Hill (who presided), the Mayor (Councillor J. P. Parkington), Ald. J. R. Hooper (Deputy Mayor), Ald. A. O. Lusher, Mr. John Greene, Dr. J. S. Hinnell, and Mr. B. S. Richards, M.A. (Head Master).

The Chairman briefly opened the proceedings and stated that they gathered that day under much happier circumstances than had been the case in some years past. They had gathered to show their interest in the old School which was doing so much for the town and county. He called upon Mr. Richards, the Head Master, to present his report.

THE SCHOOL'S YEAR.

Mr. Richards, having read several apologies for absence, referred to the loss the School had sustained by the death of Archdeacon Hodges. During his 24 years in Bury the Archdeacon was a great friend of the School and was a member of the governing body. Even after his migration to Ely he remained in close contact with them, and the School was one of his keenest interests. He was a great personal friend of his (the Head Master) and gave him very valuable assistance and advice when he first came to the School. Another old friend of the School was the late Mr. Gery Milner-Gibson-Cullum, some of whose forebears were at the School. Mr.

Richards then proceeded to welcome the visitors. Their School, he said, always found a place in the heart of the Mayor of the Borough, by reason of the fact that many of the boys belonged to Bury. They were delighted, too, to see the Lord Lieutenant of the County present, and he hoped that many of the boys now in the School would pass out and do useful work for the County. He proceeded to give a resumé of the work of the School during the year. Most people, he said, thought that in such schools they merely gathered for work for a few hours, played about a little, and then finished, but he hoped they would bear with him while he gave a brief account of what had been done. He was pleased to be able to state that their numbers had increased and there were now 122 boys in the School, a very satisfactory total. A School like that ought to be prosperous, it had everything in its favour in the shape of traditions and the history of past scholars. Last week they were visited by inspectors, who were now very human individuals, sympathetic and helpful. One of the inspectors laid great stress on the importance of reading good novels, which he had himself advocated at a previous speech day, and of which they no doubt realised the necessity. At the commencement of the term they had divided each form into two sections—the Romans and Carthaginians. The result was that there was a great deal of keenness and competition, each boy being pitted against another.

SUCCESSSES.

Among scholastic successes gained he would mention G. S. Gough, scholar of Pembroke College, Cambridge, who had been awarded the Blackburne Daniell prize for mechanical science with a B.A. scholarship and £40 for research work. R. G. Evans gained a first in the geography Tripos last June and also gained his "Blue" for cricket. He believed that there had been as many "Blues" for cricket awarded to Old Boys of that School as had been gained by any other school of its standing. He would also like to mention the success of Tom Ashton on the hockey field. With Evans he had played for Beckenham, and a London journal had described him as one of England's most promising young players. The School still carried on an Officers' Training Corps, not in a spirit of militarism, but simply for the sake of discipline and camaraderie the O.T.C. inculcated. Capt. Macready, D.S.O., from the War Office, had made a good report of his inspection. The Corps had gained certificate "A," and in the examination in various military subjects, two cadets, Hinnell and Lipscomb, obtained certificates.

OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATION.

In former days there used to be a very strong Old Boys' Association in connection with the School, and he would like to see it renewed. A good nucleus of Old Boys in London were anxious to see it, and it was proposed to raise a football team to compete in the Arthur Dunn Cup in January. It was hoped to revive the association and have cricket and football matches regularly. At the end of last term, two boys left who had been of great assistance to him—Jack Hinnell and Dowse, the cricket captain. He would like to thank the senior boys and staff for the support they had given him, and in that connection he would mention that the ten years he had been there had been the happiest and busiest of his life. He also desired to thank the Governors for their support, and ventured to hope that the parents of the boys were satisfied with all that went on; he appealed for their confidence and interest in the School.

Sir Courtenay Warner was accorded a hearty reception. In the course of a brief address, before he presented the prizes, he said he was delighted to see the School prospering as it was. He had been very much interested in Mr. Richard's report, it was a great thing to know that the younger generation was growing up better and stronger. Too many people to-day did nothing, and there were many who went about saying they wanted to do nothing. The loafer was of no use to the world, if they were only keen about their games they would get keen about work eventually. Although they made a great fuss about "Blues," being a "Blue" was not enough. They needed to be keen about life and anxious to do something well. Let them try to do things well and be really keen. Many boys who had seemed stupid had turned out to be great men because they had worked hard. What he would like to commend to boys of all ages, and it applied to a good many men and women, was "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with all thy strength and with all thy might." They were bound to succeed in the end by hard work, and success led to success. They had a good Head Master and Staff and by working with them they would maintain the great traditions of their School. By all working together and taking a real interest in what they did they would eventually see many more portraits around the walls of great men who had come from the School.

The Mayor briefly spoke and mentioned that in the past the tradesmen of the town had raised an eleven to play a cricket match with boys from the School, and his (the Mayor's) grandfather had played in the tradesmen's team. Next season he would like to captain a similar team to play the School. (Applause). He congratulated Mr. Richards on the progress made by the School.

A vote of thanks, proposed by Mr. Oliver Lusher and seconded by the Deputy Mayor (Alderman J. Ridley Hooper), was heartily accorded to Sir Courtenay Warner, and a vote of thanks to Canon Hill for presiding, concluded the ceremony. Tea was served to the visitors at the close of the proceedings.

Cricket.

BURY SCHOOL v. KING'S SCHOOL, ELY.

The return match was played at home on July 2nd. The wicket was hard and the weather hot. The School batted first and the innings began very disastrously. Hinnell and Dowse, the best bats of the side, who went in first, were both dismissed for only a few runs. Hinnell was unfortunate in

being run out. Ashton played good cricket for 15, and Steed scored a useful 11, while Gould hit hard and scored 22. The Ely fielding was distinctly good.

Ely compiled the necessary number of runs for five wickets and closed their innings for 140. Gould bowled well and obtained seven wickets for 49 runs, while Dowse captured two for 12. Scores:—

CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

††R. E. DOWSE (Captain). Has given his team every encouragement and practiced them regularly at nets and in fielding. Has proved a useful bat and has done good work at the wicket. Towards the end of the season he exhibited considerable skill in the use of his bowlers.

††G. J. HINNELL. Has developed into a forceful bat and can score quickly. His bowling has much improved but is apt to be erratic through lack of confidence. Is a safe field.

†G. H. LIPSCOMB. A hard hitting but uncertain batsman. Has possibilities as a change bowler. An excellent catch and good field.

†J. N. B. ASHTON. A very promising bat, is particularly strong on the leg side. With a change of action might be useful as a bowler. Is a quick fielder but his throwing is weak.

†L. C. H. DE CHATELEUX. Bids fair to become a batsman. His style is getting less cramped and his footwork has improved. With increased reach and power and better timing he should score freely next season. Is a smart field, throwing in well at short ranges.

*H. A. CONLAN. A persevering player. In batting he is apt to be too slow. His fielding has been good.

*T. H. GOULD. A promising fast bowler, his pace is exceptional for his size. Needs to cultivate accuracy in length. His batting is vigorous but erratic; with practice he will be a very useful bat.

*J. STEARN. A player of capabilities. He can bowl quite well, but is apt to sacrifice pitch to pace. His batting is steady, except that he is prone to draw back from fast leg balls. In fielding he must learn to get behind the ball to stop it.

*J. M. DIXON. A promising bat. Has an easy style and some good off strokes; should learn to be a bit quicker. Has filled the position of first-slip very well.

*C. F. STEED. An unenterprising bat. A safe catch; he has filled his place at square-leg very efficiently. Throws in strongly.

P. DE BASAGOITI. Exhibits possibilities as a bowler. Has improved in batting and fielding; must endeavour to get behind the ball and close his heels when fielding.

SECOND ELEVEN CHARACTERS.

*S. S. STRICKLAND (Captain). Has been very keen and done his best for a weak team. Is apt to keep his bowlers on too long. Has improved in batting. A fairly reliable field.

*C. J. HINNELL. Is developing into a bat; is rather slow and rigid at present; needs to get his left shoulder more over the ball. A safe field and a promising change bowler.

*M. L. MORTON. A steady bat; has a good off-drive, but needs to develop more strokes. A safe catch and bowls a fairly good length ball.

*R. C. GOOCH. A vigorous but unorthodox batsman and chief scorer for the team. With more science he should be a rapid-scoring, safe bat. Has improved at wicket-keeping, usually succeeds in getting behind the ball but must endeavour to hold it.

*M. J. BIRMINGHAM. A free hard-hitting bat, must endeavour to play a straight bat. Gives promise as a fast bowler, his pitch is erratic. A good field.

*M. MUMFORD. Another forceful bat and promising bowler, needs much practice in both departments to be reliable. A good fielder.

*B. S. LIPSETT. Has improved in batting but still has a stiff awkward style. A safe and hard-working fielder.

*E. D. BOBY. An enterprising but thoroughly unreliable batsman; must learn to play with a straight bat. Has fielded brilliantly on occasion. With patient practice might develop into a good bowler.

- *A. S. WAUGH. Has bowled some good overs but soon tires. In batting must learn to stand up to leg balls, and in fielding to get behind the ball.
- *E. R. R. POWER. Shapes well at batting but has more style than strength. Is an alert field and promises well as a bowler.
- *G. C. BACON. Has a good eye and a free batting style. Should do well when he has learnt to play straight and not draw away. Fielding needs improvement. S.S.S.

Football.

BURY SCHOOL v. FORNHAM.

The first match of the season was played away on September 24th, in hot weather. The School scored from a rush at the commencement of play. After much even play Fornham scored, when the School again took the lead until near the interval, when Fornham equalised.

In the second half Steed scored from a fine shot, but Fornham soon after put through their 3rd goal, to which Bury replied with 2 in succession; however, the home team managed to equalise before the final whistle blew. Mr. Tobin, at half, played an exceptionally fine game, making opening after opening for the forwards. Boby's and Steed's goals were the results of good work. a lively ball making accuracy and neatness extremely difficult. Although the County School did most of the attacking the School seized one of the few opportunities that came their way and scored a goal after a prolonged and tenacious tussle in our opponent's goal area.

The second half was all in favour of the County School, and play was practically confined to our half, and, although Conlan made two brilliant individual efforts from the half-way line, we were overwhelmed while the opposition took toll to extent of 4 goals, 2 of which were in the nature of downright genuine "gifts."

Gooch, in goal, played extremely well, but the backs in front of him were woefully unreliable and spent most of their time "bottled-up" in the goal-mouth. The halves played well and bore the brunt of the game, Steed being the best man on the field and getting through the work of three men. As a line, however, they should tackle far harder and more resolutely and realize that a halves' game is primarily an offensive one. In this match they were wholly on the defensive and failed to get those essential passes to the forwards, whose play consequently suffered so that they were not sufficiently in prominence. We saw enough, however, of our wing men, Ashton and Boby, and of our centre, Conlan, to regret that they had not an aggressive line of "feeders" behind them to bring out their best, which is undoubtedly of a high quality.
