## CHARACTERS OF THE ELEVEN.

†C. F. STEED (Captain) (centre-half). As captain he has worked hard and has not spared himself. He might however advantageously have been more autocratic with some members of his team. Has played an excellent game at centre-half, his low push-passes, well timed and accurate, give the forwards every advantage, and are the acme of skill and judgment.

†H. A. CONLAN (left-back). He has proved a great asset to the team, combining well with the other back. His kicking is strong but he is apt to misjudge high balls.

†D. WAUGH (right-back). Has improved greatly since last season, playing very well at back, his kicking being strong and accurate. Has learnt to use his weight to advantage but could utilize it to a still greater extent.

\*T. H. GOULD (inside-left). Seems able to play well in any position. He is a very good shot and is responsible for the majority of goals scored for the School. When attacking he is apt to lag behind the other forwards through a mistaken idea of helping the halves.

- †\*E. D. BOBY (centre-forward). Has found this position difficult. He is handicapped by his size but is quick and tries hard. Will be able to fill this difficult position with success when he possesses increased weight. Has the knack of finding openings and getting his wings in motion.
- †\*J. N. B. ASHTON (outside-right). Although small he has filled this position with success. He is never dismayed by a big opponent. His passing is good but his centering is weak; this will be remedied with increased strength.
- ||G. H. LIPSCOMB (right-half). A persevering player. Is apt to be tricked by a small opponent, and should use his weight more often. Has improved enormously during the season.
- ‡||R. C. GOOCH (goal). A player who does not lose his head in difficulties. His clearing has improved, but he has been unfortunately muddled by the backs on several occasions; if he shouted "Right" when able to take a ball this would be avoided.
- ||B. S. LIPSETT (inside-right). Is a keen player who tries hard. He is however rather slow in getting off after receiving a pass and does not always utilise a player who is in a better position than himself.
- ||J. E. STEARN (right-half). Has made a good captain of the second eleven. In the few games he has played in the first he has shown promise as a half. Must always remember to stick to his man.
- P. DE BASAGOITI (outside-left). He has not quite come up to expectations this season. His kicking and centering are very weak; he however always tries hard.

- A. W. BEST (back). Can kick hard but does not always do so. Is inclined to muddle the goalkeeper and should remember to go straight for the ball without hesitation.

## SECOND ELEVEN CHARACTERS.

- \*J. E. STEARN (Captain) (centre-half). Has worked hard, feeds his forwards well, and has a useful long kick; needs to practice tackling more whole-heartedly.

- \*L. C. H. DE CHATELEUX (inside-right). A tricky and resolute forward; is inclined to hold the ball too long, and must endeavour to make ground immediately on receiving the ball, and shoot or pass harder.
- \*C. J. HINNELL (goal). Has the makings of a very good goalkeeper; keeps cool. Should make an attempt to stop the most difficult shots; especially needs practice in fielding and clearing ground shots.
- \*A. S. WAUGH II. (outside-right). Is apt to hang back and watch the man instead of going for the ball. Is fast, makes ground, and centres comparatively strongly.
- \*E. W. COOK (left-back). Can kick hard but should try to pass to a man. Tackles well, but falls down too frequently.
- \*A. W. BEST (left-half). With consistent practice would make a thoroughly good player as he can both kick and tackle well. Has plenty of energy but at present is thoroughly unreliable. Frequently miskicks, and overruns his forwards.
- \*D. FULCHER I. (right-back). A player of solid parts. He is rather slow and inclined to miskick, but is keen and a hard worker.
- \*D. ALSTON (right-half). A most promising and reliable player, what he lacks in weight and height he makes up in perseverance and accuracy.
- \*D. NORTON (inside-left). A neat player, passes well; with more dash and shooting power he should be a very useful forward.
- \*S. S. STRICKLAND (half). A persevering player but is rather slow, needs to kick harder and with more precision. Heads well.
- \*F. S. WAYMAN (outside-left). Has considerably improved during the season. He makes ground but frequently loses the ball, or loses his balance when trying to stop or centre.
- M. J. BIRMINGHAM (centre-forward). Except for one or two displays he has been very disappointing. He must endeavour to put more life into his game, go for the ball or the man instead of hanging back, and he must shoot at once when in front of goal.
